J. R. Keller of Oklahoma, a passing motorist, found the body of O'Dell by the overturned truck. The victim had been working at Albany, Ore.

Press Muzzled At Big Three Conferences

Reporters Protest Treatment From Army Officials

BERLIN, Aug. 2 (UP) — Adjournalment of the big three conference closed one of the strangest sideshows in journalistic history.

It was a sorry affair for the more than 100 correspondents who attempted futilely to "cover" the historic session. One veteran foreign correspondent summed it up:

"The world press took a beating at Potsdam!"

Enforced

Press coverage — or lack of it — of the big three meeting probably was without parallel in peacetime reporting of world events. Correspondents wondered whether it foreshadowed a future policy of cloaking all high-level international deliberations in secrecy — with rifles and bayonets to enforce it.

There was nothing at the conference remotely resembling freedom of the press. The complete hush-hush policy ruled out even the wartime practice of permitting correspondents to contact informed and reliable news sources.

One Observer

For the past two and half weeks, correspondents have been fed relatively unimportant, sometimes even inaccurate, morsels of news. Most of them were even laughable.

The crushing blow came during the final stages of the conference when the press was informed its request to permit reporters to witness the final session had been denied.

Instead, the conferees permitted one eyewitness to attend in the role of observer, but some of the information he brought back was cut by army censors.

PROTEST MADE AGAINST CENSORSHIP

WIESBADEN, Aug. 2 (UP) — The United States group control council's public relations policy was regarded by American newsmen today as favoring censorship at the source and tending to imperil the freedom of the press.

It was learned today USGCC public relations chief Lt. Col. S. J. Duncan-Clark's office has been removing correspondents' filed dispatches from the censor's office for inspection.

Study Trends

The reason for this action was given as enabling the public relations officer to study news trends. Correspondents, however, pointed out such a procedure of "studying news trends" by the public relations office was unheard of even during the height of the European war.

USGCC operates under the command of U. S. forces in the European theater, and therefore correspondents considered it most unusual any individual public relations unit should be allowed to examine any correspondent's complete file.

Markets

Stocks Lower On Increased Volume

NEW YORK, Aug. 2 (UP) — Selling by cautious traders in advance of the issuance of the Potsdam conference communique today sent stocks down irregularly on slightly increased volume.

Traders anticipated a favorable announcement. There was talk in the street of possible alignments that would hasten the end of the war and plunge the nation into reconversion difficulties.

In a few instances losses ranged to more than a point. A break of more than 7 points in Standard Oil of Ohio preferred was attributed to the fact the stock has been called for redemption at a price below the current market price.

Laval to Testify In Treason Trial Of Old Marshal

Neither Side Wants Very Badly To Hear Him

PARIS, Aug. 2 (UP) — Pierre Laval will testify Friday in the treason trial of Marshal Henri Philippe Petain, the judge of the French high court announced today.

Justice Pierre Mongibeaux announced the decision to summon Laval as a witness for what may prove to be one of the most dramatic events of the war criminal trials.

Fear Laval

Neither the prosecution nor the defense was anxious to hear Laval, the Vichy chief of government. They feared his testimony might tear the trial of Petain wide open.

Petaim and Laval will confront each other in the tiny courtroom of the palace of justice about 1:30 p. m. tomorrow. It will be the 11th day of Petain's trial, which today wound through the testimony for a series of secondary witnesses.

The swarthy Laval, regarded as France's No. 1 war criminal and arch-collaborator with the Germans, will be brought from his cell in Fresnes prison, where he was lodged yesterday on his return to France after expulsion from a haven in Spain.
