Japanese-American Soldiers Honored

ROME, Aug. 4 (UP)—The first
of the Japanese-American soldiers
in the fifth army are returning
to the United States. It was re-
vealed today. A statement to them
by Lt. Gen. Lucian K. Truscott,
commander of the fifth army, said:

"You have demonstrated con-
clusively that no matter what the
racial background may be, you
are as good as the best soldiers
in this American army—which in
my opinion is the finest in the
world."

"You have shown, too, by your
exemplary conduct that in being
good soldiers you are also fine
American citizens."

Individual units of the Japa-
nese-Americans who are return-
ing belong to the 442nd regiment,
which received three presidential
unit citations.

Killer's Attorneys Will Appeal Case

VALE, Aug. 4 (UP)—Attorneys
for Kenneth Bailey, sentenced to
die Aug. 10 for the murder of
Ted R. Chambers, state policeman,
will appeal the case to the su-
preme court, they announced to-
day.

Chambers was killed in a gun
duel between officers and band-
its April 29. Court-appointed at-
torneys for Bailey are Charles W.
Swan of Vale and A. L. Fletcher
of Nysa, Ida.

Bailey apparently without
funds, has asked for the appeal,
Swan says. The right to appeal
was granted following the custom
in death sentences and the coun-
ty court agreed to provide funds
for the appeal.

Circuit Judge M. A. Biggs, un-
der whose jurisdiction Bailey was
tried, has agreed to issue a cer-
tificate of probable cause and an
order directing stay of execution
allowing time for the case to be
heard before the supreme court.
