## Why Does Atom Act That Way? Badgley Explains

(Continued from Page 1 to the fractional atomic weights. Same as Mass.)  
In 1932 Chadwick discovered the neutron and Neils Bohr's original atom model was now made up of protons (hydrogen nuclei) neutrons and electrons.  
Let us now build a simple atom and see what happens.  
Two protons plus two neutrons should give us an alpha particle or helium nucleus. But when we add up the masses of the protons and neutrons we find that it is not the same as the mass of the alpha particle. What has happened to part of this mass? How could it disappear and what did it become?

It was Einstein who gave us, from his relativity theory, the concept of the equivalence of mass and energy. From his equation E=mc<sup>2</sup> he showed that one gram of mass was equal to 25 million kilowatt hours.

This was sensational to say the least. Here was evidence that energy could be obtained from the annihilation of matter.  
**Much Energy**  
Just think of the wonderful possibilities. If we burn one gram of coal we obtain about one, one-hundredth of a kilowatt hour. But if we annihilate one gram of coal or one gram of anything, for that matter, we obtain 25 million kilowatt hours or enough energy to run the city of La Grande for about two years and two months.

But let's get back to this atom bomb business. It is a great secret but so far as we know it is not based on the annihilation of matter but upon another great source of energy, the disintegration of the atom.  
E. O. Lawrence and others with the cyclotron have been breaking up the atom now for some time.

In 1937 Enrico Fermi showed that it could be broken up by bombarding it with slow speed neutrons.  
In 1939 Uranium atomic weight 235 was broken up into xenon and strontium (the process is called fission) with the release of enormous energy. As each uranium atom breaks up it gives off a neutron which can in turn break up another uranium atom and this goes on until all the uranium is destroyed. Possibly the atomic bomb is Uranium 235. Who knows until Uncle Sam decides to tell? Anyway, I'm glad I'm on our side.

## Arthur I. Tucker, Portland, Is Dead

PORTLAND, Aug. 9 (UP)—Funeral arrangements were pending today for Arthur I. Tucker, former vice president of the United States national bank in Portland, who died in Los Angeles Tuesday. Tucker was a leader in development of Portland as a major port and was commissioner for the port of Portland from 1926 to 1933. After six years of banking in Nebraska, Tucker came to Portland in 1910 and

worked for the Lumbermen's national bank. When it consolidated in 1917 with the United States national bank, he was appointed vice president and later served as director and chairman of the executive committee before retiring in 1934.
