Japanese Now Plan Cities of Future To Replace Losses

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 9 (UP)—Japan, spurred by allied air attacks on the homeland, is turning attention to Japanese "cities of the future."

Tokyo radio, recorded by United Press, said the Nippon Times pointed out that "since enemy air raids are making possible extensive replanning of Japanese cities, no time should be lost in seeing to it this replanning is done in such a way as to express most accurately the true character of Japanese social ideals."

The Times agreed with home minister Genki Abe the "cities of the future" should not be allowed to have more than 1,000,000 inhabitants. "Simplicity, restraint, chastity, beauty and appreciation of things" should stress the Japanese spirit. And any smaller, less congested cities will always "render possible quicker evacuation" under air raids, Tokyo added.
