TODAY'S SPORT PARADE

NURNBERG, Aug. 10 (UP)—The cream of the American Athletes in the European theater takes over today in the big Nazi stadium built to glorify the muscle men of the "master race."

There isn't anything domineering or superior in the array of G. I.s, who will be using the same fighting hearts in the finals of the European track and field championships that they had in the long hard battle to stamp out nazism.

Big Field
There is so much of this stadium the service men will need only a portion of it to put on their show in the same setting where on occasion as many as 150,000 rabid nazis attended pageants and demonstrations.

The size of this world's largest sports and pagentry coliseum can be appreciated by watching the various serviceman baseball teams work out on their big diamond, which occupies about one fifth of the arena inside even though the foul line fences are 325 feet away and the center field depth is 400 feet.

Jew Baiter
Nearby is the "old stadium" where most of the track workouts have been held on the field which received the international gold medal in 1934 as the most beautiful athletic facility in the world. The stadium is just outside Nurnberg, the most rabid of all the Nazi cities and the home of Jules Streicher, the "jew baiter."

The city, nearly destroyed by allied bombing attacks, has only the half-levelled grand hotel to quarter officers' mess and visitors. Five American sports writers touring Europe as the army's guests were guided to rooms and cautioned not to step through the wrong door "or you'll plunge to death." Needless to say none of them did.

Rebuilding
Hermann Goering and other Nazi biggies used to occupy the Grand Hotel. American soldiers now stroll through the lobbies and along the sidewalks that bound it, scowling at the sullen native men but smiling at the frauleins who appear to be delighted.

The G. I.s can't understand why Uncle Sam keeps them in Nurnberg to supervise the rebuilding of the city.

"Let these so-and-so's rebuild their own city and send us home," is a typical comment.

Tobin Comes To Aid Winning Detroit Tigers

Yanks Win For McCarthy With Ruffing Hurling

NEW YORK, Aug. 10 (UP)—Jim Tobin brought his tantalizing "crawl ball" to the Detroit Tigers today in an effort to insure them the American League pennant.

Tobin, whose slow stuff made him one of the most bewildering pitchers in the National League, was waived out surprisingly yesterday by the Boston Braves.

Although the big right-hander won 18 games last year, he had failed to round into top form this season and had won nine while losing 14. However, a change of uniform has helped a number of other players this year and the Tigers gambled \$7,500.

Second Pitcher

Tobin was the second pitcher they had acquired in as many days. They picked up George Caster, relief artist from the rival St. Louis Browns, the day before.

The Tigers, who have been in first place continuously since June 12, had to win to stay up there yesterday, but the manner in which they beat the Red Sox, 11 to 5, at Detroit gave their supporters a lot of encouragement. Generally weak-kneed in their hitting of late, the Bengals batted Red Sox pitchers for 15 safe blows.

Third Win

It was "welcome back" for Manager McCarthy of the Yankees who was greeted with a 3 to 2 victory over the Indians at Cleveland after he returned from two-weeks illness. He saw one of his pre-war pitchers, Charley (Red) Ruffing, chalk up his third victory. The other two came while McCarthy was away. The Yankees won the ninth on singles by Mike Garbaruk and George Stirnweiss and a fly by Bud Metheny.

Washington went after two Chicago pitchers for 14 hits and beat the White Sox, 7 to 2. The climax came in the fifth when five hits produced six runs. Mickey Haefner won his 11th game, getting most of his hitting support from former army officer Buddy Lewis, who made a double and two singles.

Dodgers Gain

Al (Boots) Hollingsworth of the Browns, outduelled Bobo Newsum of the Athletics at St. Louis, winning, 1 to 0, with a three-hitter. It was Hollingsworth's sixth win and Newsum's 15th defeat. Newsum has pitched 11 games this season when the A's gave him two runs or less.

The third place Dodgers gained ground in the national with a twin win over the Reds at Brooklyn, 9 to 2 and 4 to 3. Art Herd led only one damaging blow, a ring won his sixth game. He yielded only one damaging blow, a homer to Frank McCormick. Rookies Ralph Branca outpitched Howard Fox in the 12th inning afterpiece in which he struck out 11 men, allowing just six hits. Babe Herman, batting for Branca, singled home the winning run in the 12th.

Cubs Lose

An ex-teammate slowed down the hot Cubs at Boston where Big Bill Lee pitched the Braves to a 7 to 3 victory, beating Paul Derringer.

The Cardinals moved within five and a half games of the lead with a 5 to 3 victory over the Giants at New York. Harry Brecheen, despite a shaky fifth in which he gave up homers to Carroll Lockman and Danny Gardella, won his seventh game. The Cards made four runs in the fourth on five singles and a sacrifice.

Ken Gables, Pirate rookie, won his seventh game against one defeat at Philadelphia, beating the Phils, 3 to 1.

Farmer Hal Turpin and the veteran Ad Liska hooked up in a pitcher's duel Thursday night in Vaughan street park and Turpin and the Seattle Rainiers won, 3-1, to cut the Portland Beavers' Pacific coast baseball league lead to six games.

Down in the middle of the league standings, San Francisco broke a fourth-place tie with an 8-0 victory over Oakland; Sacramento defeated San Diego, 6-2, and Los Angeles bunched all their scoring in three innings to pummel Hollywood, 8-4.

2 to 1 Edge

The Rainiers' victory gave them a 2-1 edge in their current series. Turpin had Portland shut out until the ninth inning when Frank Shone singled and moved over to third on a double. He scored on an infield out. Seattle drew first blood in the opening stanza on Bob Gorbould's hit, Hal Patchett's double and an infield out.

Patchett's hitting figured in all the Seattle runs. In the third he singled again and promptly stole second and took third on another hit. He came across on a wild throw to the plate.

Whitewash

In the seventh his third single scored Turpin with the final Suds' marker. Frank Seward, who started both games for San Francisco last Sunday against Seattle and was batted out in the first inning of each game, did an about face Thursday night as he restricted the Oaks to seven hits while hanging a whitewash on them.

The Seals scored five of their runs in the second inning. Neill Sheridan, who doubled, scored on Roy Nicely's hit. After Bruce Ogdrowski drove Nicely home, Seward hit and Bernie Uhalt was safe on a fielder's choice, filling the bases.

Big Bruce scored Odel Young's fly. Jake Caulfield booted Emil Mailho's grounder and Ed Charley Peterson climaxed the inning by crashing out a double to send Uhalt and Mailho home.
