### U. P. Continues to Hunt Sender of False 'Flash'

NEW YORK, Aug. 14 (UP)—The United Press stepped up its investigation today into the false surrender flash which was fed into its wire system Sunday night. A reward of \$5,000 was offered by the U. P. for the identification and conviction of the person responsible.

The American Telephone & Telegraph company reported to the federal communications commission and the U. P. that an investigation had shown that the false flash did not originate in any of its test stations.

The A. T. & T. said it would continue to co-operate with the United Press and the FCC in investigation of the incident. Kent Cooper, executive director of the Associated Press, last night recommended to the A. P. board of directors that the A. P. "add an appropriate amount to the reward offered by the United Press."

### Army Teaches How To Read Quickly

CHICAGO (UP)—The average illiterate or non-English speaking soldier can acquire fourth-grade reading skill in eight weeks, according to Paul Witty, former army major assigned to training illiterates.

"The army program demonstrates the validity of teaching words related to daily experiences," Witty, now professor of education at Northwestern university, said.

He cited the value of visual aids, as well as the soldier's "desire to learn," in accelerating reading and writing skill.
