MR. PRINGLE: (yelling) If you'll stop acting like a maniac, Lenny, I'll show you this cable and—
At this moment, cautiously circling the tree, Pringle trips over a coil of garden hose and sprawls clumsily on the ground.

EXT. GARDEN
REVERSE SHOT
The prostrate Pringle is in the f.g. His dilemma is concealed by the tree from Mrs. Pringle who, in the b.g., is standing at the screen door with Mrs. Archer. MRS. PRINGLE: Raymond, get me that telegram.
Raymond grabs the telegram from his father's hand and skates over to the porch with it.

CLOSE SHOT—PRINGLE AND ARCHER
Archer stands panting over his prostrate enemy. Pringle raises

movement to strangle the child, but reluctantly restrains himself. MR. ARCHER: (groaning) For the love of heaven—I'm related to you!

REVERSE SHOT
Archer and Pringle come into the hall where the proud and reconciled parents are joined by Uncle George and Louise. It is an excited group. Only Dexter is apart from the others. He mooches down the hall towards the porch dejectedly.

EXT. PORCH
CLOSE SHOT
Dexter merely glances around as Corliss, deashing herself from the others, comes bouncing happily onto the porch.

CORLISS: Oh, Dexter! Isn't it all too wonderful for words?
DEXTER: (bitterly) They're not going to let us get married now, you dope!
CORLISS: Oh, don't be a goon. I mean about Mildred and Lenny—their having a baby and everything.
DEXTER: (with no enthusiasm whatsoever) Uh-huh.

Mrs. Archer comes onto the porch, radiant with happiness. She looks at the two kids, shaking her head.

MRS. ARCHER: And as for you two sweet, crazy, quixotic little idiots—I ought to spank you both!
CORLISS: (stungly) Well, golly, I swore in blood not to tell. (with a smug smile) I thought we put on a pretty good act, didn't you, Mum?

CLOSE SHOT—CORLISS, MRS. ARCHER AND DEXTER
Mrs. Archer has one arm around Corliss, and with her free hand she is patting Dexter's cheek affectionately.

MRS. ARCHER: You certainly fooled me—but I should've known that Dexter couldn't do a thing like that.
DEXTER: (this is the crowning insult) Hozy cow!

Roosevelt was unable to bring up the subject of Japan while Churchill was present, but in several private discussions, he emphasized the point Russia's entry into the war would materially shorten the far eastern conflict.

Stalin not only agreed, but pointed out that Japan, being a fascist nation, was a natural enemy of the Soviet Union and of all the allied anti-fascist powers. He begged off from detailed discussions, however, on the ground Russia had only then begun to push the Germans from the vicinity of Moscow.

However, Stalin's assurances were such—especially after Roosevelt sided with Stalin regarding the second front through France—that when Roosevelt returned from the Tehran conference, he was certain that barring unpredictable difficulties, Russia would fight Japan.

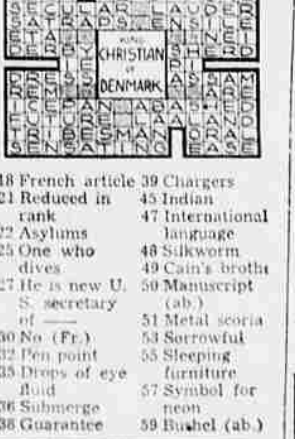
