Logging, transportation and food processing industries are badly in need of workers and are expected to absorb a large part of workers leaving war jobs.

In case the warplant layoff comes too quickly and there are not enough jobs to go around, the unemployment commission now has nearly \$73,000,000 with which to tide workers over.

Japanese Parked Swords, Tried to Be Comfortable
MANILA, Aug. 20 (UP)—Most of the Japanese surrender envoys, riding in the C-54 transport plane to Manila, parked their samurai swords in the baggage racks. But grim Lt. Gen. Torashiro Kawabe, leader of the surrender mission, refused to shed his boots and spurs.

Flight lieutenant Cpl. Jack E. Dittler of Paducah, Ky., said the job was much like delivering any other air transport command load of weary passengers.

"They just slept most of the time or smoked and looked out the windows," Dittler said. Col. Earl T. Ricks of Hot Springs, Ark., piloted the plane that brought the surrender party from Okinawa to Manila. He flew low over Okinawa to give his passengers a good look.

Eight Lightning fighters escorted the plane halfway to Luzon.

Dittler said the Japanese ate hungrily from the ATC's standard box lunches, which included hardboiled eggs, sweet pickles, cheese, and corned beef sandwiches. "They sure knew how to ask for pineapple juice," he said.

All the passengers carried American money, including the old large-type bills.

not enough time to muster forces from the other nations.

Fighting Dies
Col. Sidney F. Nashbir was chief interpreter with several other American and Australian officers assisting. A young Nisei (Japanese-American) interpreter assisted air force officers.

Throughout the Pacific, fighting gradually is subsiding.

Front by front, the situation was:

Manchuria—Radio Tokyo said conferences for a truce agreement between soviet and Japanese forces had begun. Moscow said Japanese resistance had ceased.

Some Attacks
China—Fighting virtually ended. Preliminary Japanese surrender expected to be signed at Chihkiang, Hunan province.

Luzon—Two Japanese lieutenant generals were in contact with American forces to negotiate an orderly surrender, but many small isolated enemy patrols without communications still occasionally were attacking American positions.

Java—Radio Batavia said imperial Japanese forces there have received the cease-fire order.

Solomons—Japanese commander has been ordered to meet an Australian warship off Bougainville to negotiate surrender of his forces.

New Guinea—Preliminaries for the Japanese surrender have been completed.

Burma—Most fighting has ceased, but the Japanese apparently are waiting for the arrival of an imperial envoy before surrendering.

Hitler Tried to Destroy Germany, Says Goering Aide
NUERNBERG, Aug. 20 (UP)—The continued high spirits of reichsmarshal Herman Goering in the face of the imminent war crimes trial became more understandable today when it was learned he will lean heavily on the testimony of Dr. Fritz Gornert, his right hand man, who had been missing and was found recently in the Berchtesgaden area.

The United Press learned Gornert will testify Goering frequently objected to Adolf Hitler's extermination policy, particularly with regard to the Jews, and his conflict with the Fuehrer became so intense that on April 23, 1945, Hitler ordered Goering's execution.

Gornert said if an SS elite guard outfit had taken them over, they would have been shot. Gornert added it was his belief that Hitler tried to destroy Germany so he could go down in history as its last ruler.

England abolished the barbarous custom of public execution about 1868.

NEW YORK, Aug. 20 (UP)—Selective selling in the war stocks brought declines today ranging to more than 6 points in a quiet stock market.

Widest breaks centered in the railroad issues, n both stocks and bonds. In the former, Norfolk & Western broke to a new low at 233 off 6 1/2 points. Declines running to more than 3 points were noted in Baltimore & Ohio issues, Northern Pacific, Southern Pacific, and Union Pacific.

2,000 Gallons of Gas Spilled in Truck Mishap
Mogul transportation company trailer overturned early this morning on the Hot Lake road, spilling approximately 2,000 gallons of gas, state police announced today.

The truck and trailer was going east, approaching the overpass, when the accident occurred. The right rear outside tire on the trailer blew out, it was announced, causing the trailer-hitch to break. No one was injured in the accident, and the wreckage has been removed.

Truman to Seek National Control Of Atomic Energy
WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (UP)—President Truman will send to congress next month a special message proposing permanent government control over all phases of atomic energy development, it was revealed today.

Chairman Elbert Thomas, D., Utah, of the senate military affairs committee, said the measure is being prepared by the war department and he probably will introduce it after the president's message.

Thomas declined to disclose details.

Thomas said the war department bill, which congress is expected to pass without major modification, will cover both war and peacetime uses of the devastating force which precipitated Japan's surrender.

It will establish a national control body including representatives of the state, war and navy departments, civilian scientists, other technical personnel, and representatives of other interested civilian agencies.

The control body is expected to seek acquisition of all patents for the production of atomic energy which are not already in the hands of government.

Thomas said that sharing of the atomic secret with other nations may come later—(scientists estimate other nations will develop the secret for themselves within five years)—but the necessity now is to establish a national policy to control it.
