Lt. Emma Vernita Mullen, NC, USNR, has been transferred from Bainbridge island, Port Blakely, Wash., to the U. S. naval hospital, Oakland, Calif.

The Santee, which carried on fleet operations for two days at Leyte despite her damage, also saw action in the invasion of North Africa, Palau, Aitape, Hollandia, Guam and Morotai.

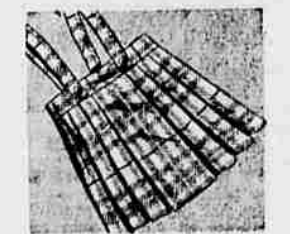

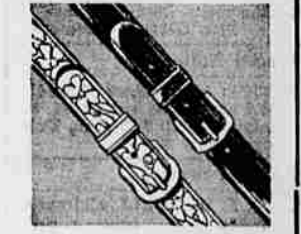

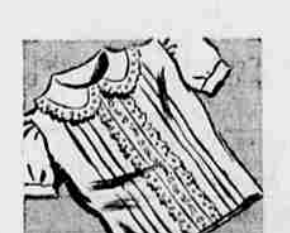
