## Eisenhower Not Worried About Army's Morale

FRANKFURT - AM - MAIN, GERMANY, Aug. 28 (UP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower had no worries today over morale of American troops in Europe, provided they are supplied with enough athletic equipment.

Given five free hours anywhere, he said, an American soldier is sure to get some kind of a game started. He described the American love of sports as a continuation of the frontier spirit. Initiative and the desire to excel, stimulated by sports, have made the Americans excellent soldiers, he added.

Eisenhower met touring American sports writers for an informal half hour at his private office in the "European Pentagon," the I. G. Farbenindustrie office buildings where more than 17,000 persons work including 4,000 officers of the headquarters command.

Eisenhower said the army is developing sports in the European theater and stimulating inter-allied competition in order to provide wholesome recreation for U. S. troops and to promote international relations.

He said he thought boxing is the greatest sport when properly undertaken, because it develops self-confidence and conquers fear of personal injury when men learn that a black eye or bloody nose is not so serious as imagined.

By next spring, he said, he hoped the only American servicemen left in Europe will be the army of occupation which may be smaller than the 400,000 originally intended to do the job. Replacements, he said, should be available for any man who has served in the war unless he desires to remain in Europe.

## Nicholson Goes To Bench To Try To Cure Slump

CHICAGO, Aug. 28 (UP)—Outfielder Bill Nicholson of the league-leading Cubs, for two years the national league's most feared hitter, was benched today for the first time since 1942.

Before leaving with the Cubs for tonight's game at Pittsburgh, Manager Charlie Grimm said last night that Capt. Phil Cavarretta will shift from first base to Nicholson's right field spot and Heinz Becker will take over first base.

Grimm said he planned to give his big slugger a rest for a couple of days in the hope that Nicholson might regain his hitting eye in time for the Cubs' crucial four-game series at St. Louis this weekend.

Nicholson, now hitting a meager .253, led the national league in both runs and runs-batted-in in 1943 and 1944. Despite his slump the husky Maryland farmer has played every inning this season. He has driven in 75 runs and hit 10 homers in 117 games this year. Last season he smashed out 33 home runs and netted 122 runs batted-in.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Aug. 28 (UP)—Phyllis Otto of Atlantic, Ia., and Mrs. Babe Diddrickson Zaharias of Denver are expected today for the fourth annual Broadmoore women's invitational golf tournament, the second contest in which the two have met within a week. Miss Otto took the women's western amateur golf tournament from Mrs. Zaharias one up last Saturday at Chicago.

## Sam Chapman To Go Back to A's Soon

PHILADELPHIA Aug. 28 (UP)—Lt. Sam Chapman, who went from the University of California football team to an outfield berth with the Philadelphia Athletics, will be released from the navy in a few days at San Diego, club officials said today.

He is expected to report to the Athletics within a week. The A's reported Al Brancato, regular shortstop in 1941, also is being discharged from the navy.

## Failure of Voiselle Puts Giants in Hole

NEW YORK, Aug. 28 (UP)—When the story of the 1945 baseball season is written, the sad case of Bill Voiselle and the consequent collapse of the Giants as pennant contenders will be a major part of the script.

What happened to Voiselle, the big likeable hurler from Ninety Six, S. C., is one of baseball's biggest mysteries and patient sleuthing by Manager Mel Ott hasn't provided even a first class clue.

Ever hopeful, Ott must wonder today if Voiselle's brilliant 4 to 0, three-hit shutout last night over the Phillies at Philadelphia may not be the turning point. Discounting that he beat the tail-enders, it must be emphasized his pitching had all the fire and diversity and the curves and cunning that made him a 1944 star. The Giants also won the second game, 6 to 2.

## Beavers to Meet San Diego to Try To Increase Lead

The Portland Beavers, apparently a cinch to win the Pacific coast league pennant, will open a series with the alternately hot and cold San Diego Padres Tuesday, while Seattle, in second place by 3 1/2 games, goes to Sacramento to engage the third-place Solons.

The San Francisco Seals, currently in fourth spot, will meet Los Angeles on the Angel's home field, prepared to send their pitching ace, Bob Joyce, to the mound twice during the series if the going gets rough. Joyce has 23 victories under his belt, and his eye is on 35 games won.

Hollywood goes to Oakland to help the A's, who have threatened on several occasions to break out of fifth place into the first division, but who now are six games away from fourth place.

## Boxers Told to Defend Crowns

PATERSON, N. J., Aug. 28 (UP)—Boxing champions were warned by President Abe J. Greene of the National Boxing Association today to defend their titles against "legitimate contenders" as soon as possible.

Greene did not mention welterweight title holder Freddie (Red) Cochrane of Summit, N. J., by name, but it was regarded significant his announcement came shortly after Cochrane's second knockout defeat in New York by Rocky Graziano in non-title competition.

## Won 21 Games

That was when he was the hottest rookie to hit the National league in many a season. He won the rookie of the year award with 21 victories on a mediocre team.

Taking up where he left off with eight straight victories this year, there was little doubt that he would go on to become one of the top pitchers in recent major league history.

Up until May 26, when the Giants were ahead by seven full games, it looked like Voiselle's pitching was the spark the Giants needed.

The three hits he allowed last night were all singles. He walked only two batters and struck out five. Rookie Sal Maglie, just out two weeks from Jersey City, made it a big night for the Giants by winning the second game. It was his third victory against one loss.

Veteran Lefty Al (Boots) Hollingsworth in a relief effort against the White Sox, won his sixth straight game and gave the Browns their fifth in a row, 8 to 7.
