Premier Calls on Japs to Fulfill Surrender Terms

TOKYO, Sept. 5 (UP)—Premier Prince Naruhiko-Kuni called on the Japanese nation today to admit defeat and to fulfill "manfully, faithfully and with broad-mindedness" all allied surrender terms.

"We are now tasting the bitter cup of defeat," he told the Imperial diet.

He said the war had been brought to an end "solely through the benevolence of our sovereign" and warned the Japanese people their duty now lies in "absolute obedience to the Imperial will."

He revealed that:

1. American air raids cut Japanese production to 25 percent of the prewar figure before the introduction of the atomic bomb.

2. The coal shortage had become so acute many factories were closing down.

3. Air raids and depreciation of rolling stock halved the carrying capacity of Japanese railroads.

4. Ship losses and the American blockade reduced the carrying capacity of Japanese ships to 25 percent of the prewar figure.

5. Air raids killed and wounded hundreds of thousands, burned 2,200,000 houses.

6. Diminishing supplies of industrial salt from the Asiatic continent began to cut into Japanese munitions production.

7. The war situation turned against Japan with the loss of Guadalcanal.

8. By May and June, Japan's material and fighting resources had become undermined.

9. Soviet declaration of war forced Japan into "the worst international situation."

Stocks Unsettled By Federal Plan

NEW YORK, Sept. 5 (UP)—Disclosure of a five-year federal plan to boost wages 40 to 50 percent with no increase in prices unsettled the stock list today. Losses ranged to more than a point.

Although the trend was down, there was no concerted pressure, sales holding well under the million-share level.

Losses of around a point or more were noted for Currier Steel, Douglas Aircraft, Chrysler and Santa Fe. Others had declines extending to nearly a point.
