

## Sacramento Loses 100 Games; Bevos Had 101 Wins

**Hafey Converts to Pitcher, Wins 7 Hit Effort**

Looking at things through the wrong end of the telescope, the Hollywood Stars hit the 100 mark in the 1945 Pacific coast league race yesterday—but that's as far as Manager Buck Fausett's club wants to go in that direction.

The whole trouble is the fact the "100" represents losses instead of wins. The Stars split a twin bill yesterday with Sacramento, 6-3 and 14-6, and although taking the opener boosted their season average a bit, they still weren't too happy.

**Take Pair**  
The Beavers split a pair yesterday, too, dropping the first game to Los Angeles, 1-4, but coming back in the finale, 6-4. San Francisco edged San Diego, 3-2, and Oakland took two from Seattle the first, 3-1, and the nightcap in extra innings, 5-4.

With 3,300 partisan fans looking on, Lefty Elmer Orella out-pitched Bob Ferguson at San Diego—the hard-luck Padre moundman getting credit for his 19th loss of the season. Bones Sanders, Seals first sacker, delivered the pay-off punch for the winners in the sixth when he singled in Frenchy Uhalt and Del Young.

**Portland Wins**  
Roy Helser got credit for his 20th victory of the year as the Portland entry won the second game with a two-run spurge in the ninth. Helser went in to relieve Don Pulford in the seventh and got the cheap win when Larry Barton doubled and Ted Gulic singled around a pair of walks. Red Adams, recently voted the Angels' "most valuable" player, pitched the opening victory.

Manager Billy Raimondi, doing a bit of reconversion on his own, tried outfielder Tom Hafey as a pitcher again and the big athlete rewarded with a seven-hitter against the Rainiers. Jay Difani and Frankie Hawkins got a single, followed by Jake Caulfield's double for the winning tallies in the fifth. Outfielder Don Smith was the hero in the finale, singling in the two tying runs in the ninth and then working the squeeze play at bat with the bases loaded in the 11th.

## Cubs Build up Five Game Lead on Cards

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (UP)—Pennant-conscious Cubs, who show mastery over every national league team but the Cardinals were building a fat cushion today to absorb any possible shocks in the five games they have left with the Missourians.

The Cubs reportedly were on the spot because of various infirmities of key players, but got off of it in a hurry yesterday with a double victory over the Giants at Chicago, 5 to 2 and 10 to 2. That put them four and a half games ahead of the Cards.

**Passau Wins**  
Ray Prim won his 11th game in the opener as rookie Regino Otero, filling in at first base, singled with the bases loaded to provide the winning edge. Ernie Lombardi ruined Prim's shutout with a two-run homer, his 19th. Claude Passeau, whose elbow pains him whenever he throws, won his 15th game in the after-piece. Andy Pafko's homer and two doubles and a single by substitute second baseman Roy Hughes paced the offense.

St. Louis topped the visiting Braves, 4 to 2. Harry Brecheen held the Braves scoreless after the first inning. Buster Adams led the Cards with three hits. Brooklyn defeated the Pirates 5 to 3 in the 10th inning at Pittsburgh. Goodwin Rosen hit two run homer. Relief pitcher Vic Lombardi was the victor.

## 'Milk Pail Kid' Is Toast of Cubs For Heavy Hitting

CHICAGO, Sept. 6 (UP)—Outfielder Andy Pafko, "milk pail kid" from Wisconsin, was the toast of the Chicago Cubs today—and the toasts were drunk in milk.

Through all of the Cubs' "tough luck," such as Phil Cavaretta's injured shoulder and Bill Nicholson's hitting slump, the sturdy-built youth from the heart of America's dairyland has played a major role in keeping the Cubs up front in the national league race.

**Second Season**  
His spirit and "clutch" performances have caused Manager Charley Grimm to put him in the cleanup spot. Hitting No. 4 on a league-leading club is quite an accomplishment for a 24-year-old playing his second season in the big time.

But if it hadn't been for an ornery cow, which kicked over a pail of milk some six years ago, Andy might still be on his folks' 200-acre farm near Boyceville, Wis.

There were six Pafko boys and they all loved baseball. But like most farm boys they had to do the chores before playing. One day, anxious to start a game, Andy was hurrying through the milking when a cow swished its tail in his face and booted the bucket.

**Not Sore**  
"I was madder than..." he recalled. "And I made up my mind to quit milking those fool things and try for a baseball career."

Andy hooked a ride to Eau Claire to try out with the local team. He played in the final two weeks and then caught on with Green Bay in 1941 where he hit .349 and 13 home runs.

And by 1944, the "milk pail kid" was starting in centerfield for the Cubs.

**Shuts Out Reds**  
The Reds and Phils split at Cincinnati. Rookie Mike Modak pitched the Reds to a 1 to 0 shutout in which Dick Mauney, the loser, gave only three hits. After that the Phils, paced by Vince DiMaggio who had three hits, were victors in an 8 to 6 "wooden wedding."

A slate of double headers brought no changes in the tight American league situation. Detroit remained two and a half games in front after splitting with the Yankees at New York. Eddie Mayo's three run homer, followed by a bases-empty clout by Hank Greenberg gave the Tigers four runs in the ninth and a 10 to 7 first game victory.

Lefty Joe Page cooled the Tigers in the second game, spinning a three-hit, 4 to 1 victory. The Yankees got all their runs off Alton Benton in the first three innings.

**Senators Split**  
The Browns and Senators split two extra-inning games at Washington. The Senators took the opener 2 to 1 in the 11th on a bunt and two singles. Rick Ferrell drove in the winning run for Mickey Haefner. Lou Finney tied the score for St. Louis with a homer in the ninth of the second game. The Browns went on to win 4 to 3.

Bob Feller of the Indians rediscovered an old jinx when he dropped a 2 to 1 duel to Otis Clark at Boston in a split double headed. He had trouble winning there before the war. It was his first 1945 defeat. Allie Reynolds won his 15th game in the nightcap, 5 to 2, holding Boston to six hits.

Chicago won two from the Athletics at Philadelphia, 15 to 6 and 6 to 5 in 14 innings. Joe Haynes, starting for the first time since breaking his ankle in June, gained an easy first game victory.

## New York Giants Recall 2 Pitchers

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 6 (UP)—The New York Giants today recalled Pitchers Bob Barthelson and Frank Seward from the San Francisco Seals—effective at the end of the season.

The Seals today also announced the signing of Bob Nichols, 23, a right-handed pitcher who has just returned from 42 months of duty in the European theater—including D-day landing. Nichols was the property of the St. Louis Cardinals chain in pre-war days.

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## TODAY'S SPORT PARADE

ROME, Sept. 6 (UP)—The world of sport found a staunch friend today in Pope Pius XII, who granted touring American sports writers an audience and urged them to stress the need for athletics in the postwar commonwealth of nations.

"Sports on the whole are essential, helping to deter juvenile delinquency through providing healthful recreation and proper environments causing healthy bodies and healthy minds, resulting in good citizens," he said.

Referring to St. Paul as an early advocate of athletics, His Holiness said the idea of not indulging in sports is far from the Christian idea.

"The human body is a masterpiece of God's work and should be properly cared for in appreciation," he said.

Although he would not endorse any specific sport, stressing virtually all are beneficial if properly pursued, he gave American football an indirect pat on the back. Recalling his visit to the United States in 1936 when he was papal secretary of state, he mentioned a trip to Notre Dame university. One of the writers asked what he thought of the Notre Dame football team.

"You'd have to see it with your own eyes to believe it," he said. The Pope met the writers privately in the ambassadorial room. He emphasized his interest in the world of athletics by recalling that last May he held a large audience for sports leaders in the Rome arena.

Although frail in appearance he is surprisingly dynamic in his movements and in his mental reaction to questions.

## Argentina Tense

PORTLAND, Sept. 6 (UP)—Argentina is still a hotbed of tension and from all appearances some sort of change is on the way. S. B. Hall, Multnomah county agent, who has just returned from that country, declared today. A nationally recognized Holstein-Friesian breeder, Hall judged the Holstein cattle division of the annual Argentine national livestock show at Buenos Aires Aug. 11 to 23.

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And at night he dreamed of the day when he would perform in New York City.

But you know how those things go. There are delays. The Yankees had a pretty fair staff, so back to Oakland went Tobin. He pushed his disappointment aside, won 16 games, lost 8. It was up to the Yanks for another shot in the spring of '37.

Once more Tobin was rejected. Disappointment turned to bitterness.

From that day on Tobin lived for the time when he could make the Yankees fry. That moment appeared to be at hand in the autumn of 1938. The Yanks had already clinched the American league pennant and the Pirates were roaring down the line to the National league flag. The Bucs were derailed, however, by Gabby Hartnett's dramatic home run and Tobin sulked off to his home in California.

Following three years with the Pirates, Tobin was switched to the Braves, with whom he put in five years.

Then one of those strange deals occurred. Tobin passed unclaimed through the waiver channels and was grabbed by the Tigers. It was a warm Sunday afternoon in Detroit when the Tigers and Yankees resumed their battle for the American league leadership. The teams jousted into the ninth inning with the score tied. Jim Tobin walked slowly to the mound.

For three innings he held the Yankees scoreless. In the last of the 11th, with two men aboard, he came to bat. With a mighty swing he drove the ball 400 feet out of Briggs stadium.

People say this defeat smashed the Yankees' final hope for the championship.



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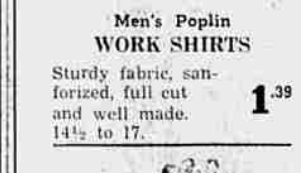

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## OPA to Prevent Sudden Eviction

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 (UP)—The office of price administration acted today to protect tenants against having their rented houses suddenly sold out from under them.

Beginning Sept. 15 OPA will require a minimum waiting period of six months before a purchaser can evict a tenant and move into his house. The waiting period is now three months.

The longer waiting period will be enforced in all rent control areas except where the OPA area rent director decides that three months is adequate. It will not apply if the buyer of the house is a former serviceman.

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
