## Eskimo Slayer Dies for Crime

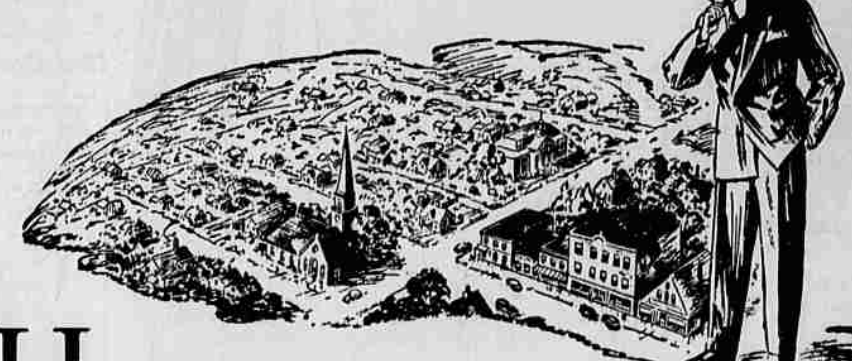
WALLA WALLA, Sept. 7 (UP)—His wife's last appeal for a stay of execution denied, Joe Bill, Eskimo sex-slayer of five-year-old Irma Irene McGough, of Seattle, died on the gallows of the state penitentiary today, the 59th man executed at the prison. Bill, claiming he killed the Seattle child "in a moment of drunken madness" April 12, entered the scaffold room at 1:06 a.m. PWT. The trap was sprung at 1:08 a.m., and prison physicians pronounced him dead 17 minutes later.

The Eskimo's white wife visited him for the last time yesterday and during the day made a third and last appeal to Gov. Mon X. Wallgren for a stay of execution.
