KLAMATH FALLS, Sept. 7 (UP) — International Woodworkers of America strike in the Klamath Falls mill of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, throwing 2,200 men idle in this area, headed for negotiation today.

Members are demanding a union shop throughout the plant.

Quisling Closes Defense With Blanket Denial

Throws Self on Mercy of Jury Of Patriots

OSLO, Sept. 7 (UP) — Vidkun Quisling, fighting desperately to escape a traitor's death, closed his own defense today with a blanket denial of the state charges and threw himself on the mercy of a Norwegian patriot jury.

The trial ended abruptly at 2:38 p.m., after the accused had been speaking for almost four hours, and the judge and jury adjourned to deliberate. Observers believe the death sentence will be announced early next week.

In Panic
The hulking defendant appeared on the verge of panic. He regained his composure quickly, however, and his voice rose to a high pitch as he described himself as an "apostle of peace" who collaborated with Germans only to save Norway from communism.

He dismissed as "pure imagination" the state charges he sold Norway's military secrets and gave the Germans detailed information on Oslo harbor fortifications, paving the way for the German invasion in April, 1940.

Foared Reds
"Could I have given information about Oslo harbor — I who know less about the harbor than any harbor worker?" he demanded.

Then he returned to his familiar theme he had only warned the Germans that Britain was about to invade Norway and that such a move would be followed by a Russian invasion.

Quisling charged Britain had notified the Norwegian government of its intention to invade Norway and march an expeditionary force across Scandinavia to aid Finland — then fighting the Red army.

Avery, Thompson Purchase Sheep At DuBois, Ida.

UNION, Sept. 7 (Special)—H. G. Avery, superintendent of the Eastern Oregon experiment station and Steve Thompson of Heppner, returned Friday from a trip to DuBois, Ida., where they visited the U. S. sheep experiment station, where large flocks of Pague and Columbia sheep have been developed.

Thompson purchased a flock of Pague sheep to take to his ranch near Heppner and Avery bought some of the Columbia rams for the Eastern Oregon experiment station.

This Columbia breed is fast becoming one of the most popular breeds in the intermountain country of the west. Working first at Laramie, Wyo., and later at DuBois, Ida., investigators of the U. S. department of agriculture, in consultation with western sheepmen set up specifications for the type of sheep desired.

To develop the Columbia breed of sheep took 10 scientists working in succession for nearly a quarter of a century and cost about \$75,000. But now that the breed is well established as an addition to the nation's sheep industry, it is paying off at least \$150,000 a year in added profits from lambs, wool and surplus breeding stock.

Wool producing value of this breed is good and like other established breeds, the Columbia is still undergoing improvement. Hundreds of specimens are used in current breeding and grazing experiments at the U. S. sheep experiment station, DuBois, Ida.

Undoubtedly the purchase of these Columbia rams by Avery for the experiment station will be of very vital interest to the sheepmen of this section.

Heart Attack Fatal To Admiral McCain

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Sept. 7 (UP) — Vice Adm. John S. McCain, who died less than 24 hours after returning to this country from surrender ceremonies in the Pacific, was worn out from the strain of the final battle against Japan, a navy physician said today.

McCain, peppery 61-year-old commander of task force 38, died suddenly of a heart attack last night at his home in nearby Coronado.

He was a veteran of 41 years in the navy. McCain was exhausted from his activities in the last four months in the final effort to batter Japan to her knees, the navy doctor said.

NLRB Seeks to Avoid Strike of Lumber Workers

SEATTLE, Sept. 7 (UP)—Despite overwhelming vote by two groups of Pacific northwest lumber workers in favor of a strike for wage increases, officials of the lumber and sawmill workers union, AFL, today sought an early meeting with operators to avert a tieup of the industry in five states.

Thomas Graham, jr., regional national labor relations board director, announced last night strike votes taken in the northwestern district council of the union and the Willamette valley district council were 6 to 1 in favor of a strike.
