Prices Narrow, Light Volume

NEW YORK, Sept. 8 (UP)—Stock prices were narrowly irregular today as Saturday trading was resumed on the New York stock exchange after a lapse since last June 30, when a summer program of Saturday closings was initiated.

Volume was very light, largely reflecting the absence of many traders for the Jewish holiday.

The holiday considerations with their effect of reducing trading, outweighed overnight announcement of Sen. George D. Ga., an overall cut of 18 percent in individual income taxes probably will be effective Jan. 1. Senator George, chairman of the senate finance committee, also said both the administration and treasury were in accord on dropping of the excess profits tax.

Activity Drops in Spot Wool Market

BOSTON, Sept. 8 (UP)—Activity dwindled in the local spot wool market for domestic and foreign sorts, and for the third consecutive week no sales developed in domestic types.

Purchasing of foreign wools continued very slow, although foreign spot wools continued in demand and some sales developed for Montevideo and Buenos Aires 60s and 60s/64s. Some importers were reported about to sell lots unshipped, but with nearby shipping dates.

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Markets

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK

CHICAGO, Sept. 8 (UP)—Hogs—100. Not enough good and choice hogs here to make a market. For the week: All markets very active with prices at the ceilings, \$14.75 for barrows and \$14.00 for gilts and sows. The weights of droves of barrows and gilts continued to run the highest on record.

Cattle 400. Calves 100. For the week: Choice fed steers and yearlings, including yearling heifers were steady to strong at \$17.00 and \$18.00 upward respectively, with top steers earning the \$18.00 ceiling freely. A sizeable supply moved from \$17.25-17.90. Choice yearlings sold at \$17.85, and choice heifers were \$17.50. A moderate supply realized \$16.25-17.25, and other grades were weak to 50c lower than the normal pre-labor holiday trade. Cows and bulls declined 25-50c. Light vealers were weak with strong weights and heavy calves 50c lower. Choice vealers sold up to \$15.00 but the practical closing top was \$14.50, with heavy calves \$13.00 down.

Sheep—500. For the week: Slaughter spring lambs were weak to 25c lower with not enough yearlings available to accurately set prices. Slaughter ewes were unevenly weak to 50c lower, with good and choice grades showing the full decline. Feeding lambs and ewes ruled steady. Good and choice native spring lambs sold from \$13.25-13.50 with bucks discounted \$1.00. One load of Washington springers sorted 25 percent early brought \$13.50 with a fair-sized lot of native springers earning the same price. The practical top for good and choice springers reached \$13.25.

PORTLAND LIVESTOCK

PORTLAND, Sept. 8 (UP)—Cattle 2,740, calves 475. Compared week ago, steers strong good grassers 25c higher, some sales 50c up; canner and cutter cows and medium beef cows around 25c lower, very draggy late. Other classes steady. Medium to good grass steers \$14-16.25, common down to \$10.50; stockers \$10.00-12.25; common to medium heifers \$9.50 to \$13.50. Load good to choice fed Montana heifers \$16; cutters down to \$7.50. Cutter and common cows \$6.00-8.00; medium to good beef cows \$10.00-12.50, odd head \$13.00. Medium to good sausage bulls \$9.50-11, good beef bulls to \$12.00, odd head \$12.50. Good to choice vealers \$13.50-14.00, few \$14.50, grass calves largely \$13.50 down.
