Stock Market Has Extended Advance

NEW YORK, Sept. 10 (UP)—The stock market today extended last week's advance with industrial and utility shares rising to new highs since 1937 and the general list at its best level since late June.

Trading was under the million-share level as Wall street generally adopted a cautious attitude pending further developments on President Truman's recommendations for a more abundant life.

SALEM, Sept. 10 (UP)—The state tax commission will meet to consider an opinion by Attorney General George Neuner in connection with the short income tax form law. Secretary Earl Fisher said today.

Neuner advised the commission Saturday to continue operation under the law, which was signed by the governor and enrolled in the 1945 session laws.

The commission had asked the attorney general whether or not they should administer the measure in view of evidence that it was not the law passed by the legislature.

Australians Favor Harsh Treatment For Jap Barbarians

LONDON, Sept. 10 (UP)—Foreign Minister Dr. Herbert Evatt of Australia demanded today that "superior officers up to the highest"—presumably including Emperor Hirohito and the Imperial general staff—be punished for Japanese barbarity in the southwest Pacific.

He made the demand in releasing Australia's official report to the United Nations war crimes commission on Japanese cannibalism and tortures. Australian newspapers reviewing the report urged the allies to scrap soft peace terms for Japan.

China Wants Puppet Ruler of Nanking

NANKING, Sept. 1 (UP)—China bluntly informed Japan today she wants Nanking's puppet premier Chen Kung-Po and seven lesser traitors removed without any further attempts to concealment.

Gen. Ho Ying Chin, Chinese army commander-in-chief, sent this brisk order to Japanese Commander Gen. Yasuki Okamura shortly after Okamura had signed formal surrender papers.

The Japanese news agency Domei called Premier Chen a suicide on Aug. 28, but Chinese authorities declared in reality Chen and his seven companions fled to Japan.

Okamura is believed to have repudiated he would take steps immediately to see what could be done in the matter.

At the same time General Ho announced Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek had exempted Nanking "until further notice" from all taxes and levies. This step was taken to give the people of China's pre-war capital a chance to recover.
