Salem Man Held in Car Death of Sailor

SALEM, Sept. 11 (UP)—State police are holding Lincoln T. Wagoner, 37, Salem, on a charge of negligent homicide in connection with a hit-and-run accident that resulted in the death of a 20-year-old sailor early yesterday.

The navy man, Robert Louis Sharp of Charleston, W. Va., was fatally injured when struck by a car on the Salem-Dallas highway three miles west of here late Sunday night.

Wagoner is a former inmate of the state penitentiary here. Bail has been set at \$5,000.

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Markets

Stocks Make up Some Early Loss

NEW YORK, Sept. 11 (UP)—Stocks started a mild recovery movement shortly before the close today under leadership of steels and in most cases made up their early losses. The lost was irregular in late dealings.

The steel group scored gains ranging to more than a point in U. S. Steel and Bethlehem, both of which hit new highs for the year. Motors followed the lead of steels and toward the close Chrysler was up nearly a point and Studebaker had a similar gain.
