Markets

Profit Taking Cuts Prices of Stocks

NEW YORK, Sept. 14 (UP) — Profit-taking reduced prices over a broad area in the stock market today on volume somewhat under that of the previous session.

Selling was particularly severe in the aircraft department where losses ranged to more than two points in Douglas and Lockheed.

The latter led the list in turnover. Boeing airplane lost a full point.

Wheat Resists Drag of Market

CHICAGO, Sept. 14 (UP) — Rye turned heavy on the board of trade today influenced by tenders on the expiring contract, the weaker stock market and lagging demand for the cash article. Wheat resisted easiness fairly well on inflation and export possibilities. Oats weakened on the partial removal of the embargo on Canadian feed grains. Corn held about steady.

Rye finished the day off 1/4 to 1/2 cent a bushel; wheat off 1/4 to 1/2 cent; corn off 1/4 to 1/2 cent; oats off 1/4 to 1/2 cent, and barley off 1/4 to 1/2 cent.

General Thinks Japs Not to Come Back

TOKYO, Sept. 14 (UP) — Occupation of Japan may be "washed up" in another year provided Japan remains without allies, Lt. Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger said today.

"Japan is no longer a military power and won't be dangerous if no one makes an alliance with her," Eichelberger, commander of the U. S. eighth army, told a press conference.

"I'm getting old and I don't think Japan will be a military power in my time unless somebody leads her by the hand."

Tacoma Fishing Boat Lost, But Six Aboard Safe

ASTORIA, Sept. 14 (UP) — The six-man crew of the Dorothy Joan, a Tacoma fishing boat, arrived in Astoria today after rescue by the coast guard when their 58-foot boat sank off Yaquina bay early Thursday. Cause of the sinking was not determined.
