Blue Chips Make Substantial Gains

NEW YORK, Sept. 21 (UP)—Substantial gains in a long list of blue chips enlivened an irregular stock market today. Trading was somewhat below yesterday's 1,500,000 shares. Allied Chemical rose 3 points to a new high. Monsanto Chemical also made a top. Eastman rose a point to a new high and then eased to the previous close. Several of the high-priced utility preferred stocks gained 1 to 3 points. High-priced rails were up a point or more.

Portland Business Properties Sold at Price of \$625,000

PORTLAND, Sept. 21 (UP)—Two major deals in Portland business property, involving about \$625,000, were announced today.

In one Joe Fisher Oregon Ltd., distributor of Dodge and Plymouth cars and Dodge trucks, purchased a four-story automobile building occupying an entire block on Portland's west side from the Provident Mutual Life Insurance company of Philadelphia for a price said to be around \$350,000.

The Artisans building was bought by the Commerce Investment company from the Mac-Cabees, Detroit, for \$275,000.

Single Price for Silver Decried

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (UP)—The United States was on a single price standard today for both domestic and foreign silver. The office of price administration boosted the price of foreign silver 25 cents to the level paid by the U. S. treasury for domestic-mined metal. The action will encourage export of silver to this country by producing countries.
