

La Grande Loses to Baker for Second Loss of Season, 19-13; Two Fumbles

BAKER, Sept. 22 (Special) — La Grande Tiger fans were wishing today they could forget the first quarter of the game played with the Baker high school last night in which mistakes cost their team two scores.

Baker, winning 19 to 13, took advantage of two fumbles by La Grande and then scored again in the third quarter.

In the second quarter, however, La Grande stiffened, took the ball on downs and marched right down the field with Max Kilgore bucking the ball over for a touchdown. The team converted to make the score 13 to 6 at the half.

Then in the second half, Baker again took charge and pushed down the field for its third touchdown of the afternoon, this time on straight football.

La Grande got into the ball game again, however, with a long pass, good for 30 yards in the air and five yards on the ground. Bennett, quarter, faded back and heaved the pigskin to Houle, tail-back, who romped to the three and a half yard line.

From there Kilgore scored his second touchdown of the day. Further scoring threats, however, dwindled.

Baker used a T formation, with a set of fast, clever ball handlers in the backfield. La Grande mostly operated from a single wing-back, but with occasional forays from the T.

● Your GI Rights Problems of Men In Service

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Here are some questions on the educational and vocational training sections of the GI Bill of Rights: Q. I have been in the air corps for the past three years as a mechanic. I want to get into some angle of the auto business as soon as I get out. If I decide to go to school, will the work I did in the army be credited to my school work and how much?

A. You will get credit for the training you received in the army if it relates to the courses you take in school. There is no fixed credit for army training as applied to school work. It is up to the individual state or institution you attend.

Q. I have a wife and two children and plan to go to college. It will be a tough job getting along on the \$75 a month. But, the way we figure, it will be impossible if we don't get that during vacations. Is this subsistence paid during vacations?

A. While you are taking a full-time course you are allowed up to 30 days leave or vacation with pay. The government will not pay that during a regular summer vacation if you are not attending classes.

Q. Several months ago I started a course of vocational training which sounded plenty rosy at the time. Since getting into it, however, I've decided it's not for me. I want to change. Can I? And how do I go about it?

A. You can change if you can give "reasonable satisfactory" to the administrator of veteran affairs. State your situation to the VA officer who assisted you in starting the first course.

Q. When I was in the sixth grade I quit to go to work and help support my mother. I got a fair job and was doing all right until I was drafted. While in service my mother died. Now I think I ought to finish grade school at least and start high school. Can I do this?

A. Yes. The government will pay for this.

College Offers Course Covering South America

Following the established policy, Eastern Oregon college will offer again this fall term special Saturday and evening classes of interest to teachers and other citizens of Union county. For teachers wishing to take work toward the completion of the B. S. degree in elementary education a three credit course in Geography of South America will be offered from 10 to 12 a.m. Saturdays. From two to six hours' credit may also be obtained in the course: Problems in Elementary Education. This course is designed to allow the student to choose his own practical problem in his teaching field. Another course will be offered Saturday from 8:00 to 10:00 in Teaching of Art for two credits.

Dr. Henry Ehlers, head of the music department, will offer a three credit course in Music Appreciation each Wednesday from 7:30 to 10:00 p.m. This course may be taken either with or without credit and any persons desiring to attend this class may register at the first meeting of the group Wednesday, October 3.

The courses in Oregon law and Oregon history will be taught on Saturday mornings, school law from 8 to 10 and Oregon history from 10 to 12. These courses are required by law for any teacher desiring permanent certification in the state of Oregon.

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Browns Still Have Remote Chance to Capture Flag

NEW YORK, Sept. 22 (UP)—Detroit Tigers, who have won 16 out of 26 games in September, need only an even break in their remaining six contests to be sure of at least a tie for the American league pennant.

Washington, with only three games left, all with the last place Athletics at Philadelphia, would have to sweep the series to tie the Tigers, provided Detroit gets an even break in its last six.

The only way the Tigers can lose the pennant will be to drop four or more games while Washington win all three.

One extremely remote possibility involved last year's champion Browns, who could squeeze in by winning all of their eight remaining games, four of which are with the Tigers. They are six games out of the lead.

The Yankees drubbed the Senators yesterday 5 to 3.

In the only other games yesterday, Dodgers won two at Philadelphia, 1 to 0 and 11 to 5.

Jap Finances Come Under MacArthur

TOKYO, Sept. 2 (UP) — Gen. Douglas MacArthur demanded a complete financial accounting from the Japanese government today preparatory to clamping new controls on the beaten enemy.

The directive coincided with the arrival by plane at Tokyo of George Acheson, jr., recently appointed political adviser to MacArthur by President Truman. He will be liaison agent between MacArthur and the U. S. state department.

MacArthur also ordered the government to arrest ailing, elderly Gen. Nobuyuki Abe, ousted governor-general of Korea, and turn him over to the American eighth army. He presumably is wanted for trial as a war criminal.

Abe was removed from his Korean post Sept. 14 by American occupation authorities and was believed to have returned to Japan. He was premier in 1930.
