Stocks Rally After Early Irregularity

NEW YORK, Sept. 24 (UP)—Stocks developed a slight rallying tendency in late dealings today after going through most of the session dull and irregular.

Volume was curtailed as the New York elevator strike spread through many buildings in the financial district. The volume to the end of the fourth hour of 6:00,000 shares was the lightest for the period since Aug. 30.

There was little in the news to affect prices and hence the movements were ascribed to technical considerations. The moderate profit-taking in the first four hours reflected caution on the part of traders anticipating some irregularity after a substantial rise.

Strikes Spread as Lumber Workers Leave Jobs Here

total number of persons made idle by labor trouble to 338,000, the highest point of the year.

8. In Michigan, Gov. Harry T. Kelly interviewed in the strike at the Kelsey-Hayes Wheel company, which has halted production of Ford cars. Kelly ordered the chairman of the Michigan labor mediation board to see what is holding up settlement of the wheel company walkout.

At Detroit, Chrysler corporation officials asked for a wage conference with representatives of the United Automobile Workers union (CIO) tomorrow.

Hopes for settlement of the spreading oil strike apparently hinged on a joint conference of union and oil company officials, scheduled for tomorrow in Chicago.

Members of the United Oil Workers International union (CIO) whose walkout has brought critical shortages to Detroit, Cleveland, Toledo, O., and Houston, Tex., struck two additional Texas refineries yesterday.

In Detroit, where automobile production already was limping because of labor disputes in 75 plants, a shutdown of all major bulk plants and refineries cut off fuel oil supplies.

So serious has the situation become industrialists warned early settlement of the month-old Kelsey-Hayes dispute would go for naught if the oil strike continued. The Kelsey-Hayes walkout has paralyzed production in Ford plants throughout the country.

Detroiters swarmed across the river to Windsor, Ont., to buy additional gasoline from Canadian sources, so far unaffected by the strike.

Elsewhere in the nation, the strike situation, for the most part, was stalemated.

A short-lived strike by 1,200 employees of the Saucen plant of the Bethlehem Steel company was called off, although 8,000 other workers remained out in the Philadelphia area.

The CIO United Auto Workers union filed formal notice with the national labor relations board of intention to call a nationwide strike in the 135 plants of General Motors, employing 400,000. Similar petitions were to be filed this week against the other of the auto industry's "big three"—Chrysler and Ford.

FAMILY INJURED—Mr. and Mrs. Joe M. Casey and son, Billy, are recovering today from minor injuries received Saturday afternoon when their truck, driven by Casey, ran off the road at the Tolocast overhead. Cause of the accident is not known here, state police said.

No. 15: The First Test Is a Success

1941

AMERICA'S SUPPLY OF U-235

1945

(1) When the smoke, dust, and debris had cleared away after the explosion of the atomic bomb in the New Mexico desert, the scientists rolled over on the ground where they lay and exchanged hand shakes. The greatest and most spectacular experiment in the history of science had been a success. They cautiously ventured to where the steel tower with the bomb had stood. It had been completely vaporized. The explosion left a crater nearly two city blocks across.

(2) The scientists gazed with amazement into the great pit. Then when the crater appeared safe enough, the scientists conducted an expedition into it. Making their way cautiously, they used specially adapted Army tanks to see what the outburst of atomic power had done to the earth.

(3) The tremendous heat had melted rocks. Even though "the height of the explosion was necessarily low," they found that only "a very small fraction of the radioactivity" released by the explosion was deposited immediately below the bomb, the official report says. From the effect of the bomb on the rocks beneath it, the scientists estimated the enormous power which they had released.

(4) How in July, 1945, had scientists found enough material to create such an explosion? In 1940 they did not have enough of the chief ingredient of the bomb—U-235—to see under an ordinary microscope and had only a few grams of pure uranium metal out of which to make U-235. The answer is that the bomb was produced by one of the most remarkable examples of scientific cooperation in history. In 1942, the scientists found a cheap process for making uranium on a large scale. From uranium they produced an entirely new chemical element—plutonium. It was comparatively easy to turn plutonium into U-235.
