

# Rich Furs, Ermine to Mink, Set Off Fall's Creations

NEW YORK (NEA) — Fur is used so lavishly for fall that you can hardly find the cloth that hides under the generous helpings of lynx, Persian lamb, beaver, ermine and mink.

Just as fur meets cloth more than half way in new coats, so does it help new suits to leap fabric shortages with lavish borders for skirts, whooping collars and muff-cuffs. Sometimes the entire jacket of a suit is patterned from fur instead of fabric, as for example, the L. J. Fox design shown, above. Here, gray Persian takes all the bows for a smart blouse topper—all that is, except a tiny nod from the gray woolen facings which flank the jacket with a fur-bordered skirt.

Lynx rippling from the lampshade skirt of a tunic-type jacket, and cuffing its sleeves from the elbow, down shoves glamor to the hilt. To settle any doubts, see the model shown at right above, which is a rich jewel-toned blue woolen suit, bordered as described with this spectacular fur.

Another type of tunic that piles up the pelts is shown, left above, in a Monte Sano-designed suit with a new talked-about style slant. The slant is a midriff wrap-around with a new buttoned-over closing, trimmed with a 15-inch border of beaver and deep cuffs to match.
