THE STORY OF THE ATOM

(1) Atomic power, plus radar, television, facsimile broadcasting, jet propelled planes, and many other advances in science, such as penicillin and sulfa drugs that quickly cure disease, should bring new living through a closely knit world. Peacetime uses of atomic power may permit the manufacture of useful machines at a fraction of their present cost, and their operation at less than one-tenth the price of the cheapest hydro-electric power available today. One pound of U-235, source of atomic power, has potential atomic energy equal to 5,000,000 pounds of coal and 3,000,000 pounds of gasoline. Miraculous in reclamation of the soil are possible. With this cheap power, water from the ocean may be piped to deserts, after being freed of the salt at small expense. The new power may enable the farmer to provide not only water but heat for his soil, so that he can create his own weather. Atomic power may bring many changes in man's mode of living. He may find it more convenient to build well-lighted air conditioned cities underground with beautiful parks, forests and farm lands on the ground above. A trip to the country, to summer's sun and winter's snow, would mean a ride of a few feet in an elevator.

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(3) Many fantastic projects to make life more easy and comfortable have been suggested. How soon will some of these be possible? The government appointed a special committee of scientists to investigate the peacetime possibilities of atomic power, and the first report is the atomic power "for special purposes" could be developed in 10 years.

Deadline for 4-H Club Show, Sale Now Saturday Noon

PORTLAND, Sept. 26 (UP)—Northwest 4-H clubbers were notified today the deadline for entries in the 34th annual 4-H stock show and sale Oct. 10 to 12 at the Portland stockyards has been extended to Saturday noon.

Indications are there will be 175 Herefords entered, a record number for the streamlined type of show. State club leader H. C. Seymour, is finishing plans for the educational programs the exhibitors will participate in while staying at Camp Plummer.

## Markets

### Mild Profit Taking Noted in Stocks

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (UP)—A mild profit-taking movement gave the main list of stocks an easier undertone today but a number of specialties scored sharp gains.

Utilities were best as a group, rising to a new high since Feb. 19, 1937, as gains in the preferreds ranged to more than 2 points in American Power & Light 6 preferred and Electric Power & Light 6 preferred.

The carrier shares, yesterday's strong spot, met some pressure and had minor declines. Norfolk & Western was an exception, rising more than 3 points to a new 1945 high.

Deliveries of Rye, Wheat at New High  
CHICAGO, Sept. 26 (UP)—All deliveries of wheat and May and December rye rose to new season highs on the board of trade today in a nervous session of rapid price changes. Late prices reacted from the best levels on profit-taking.

Grains excepting barley all finished weak, with wheat off 1/4 to 1/2 cent a bushel; corn unchanged to off 1/4; oats off 1/4 to 1/4; rye off 1/4 to 1 cent, and barley up 1/4.
