Housewives to Get More Points for Waste Fats

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (UP)—The nation's housewives will receive four red points a pound instead of two for their waste kitchen fats starting Oct. 1 under a government program to offset a serious shortage of industrial fats. The price of waste fats will remain at four cents a pound.

Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson said that every pound of waste fats was needed to "speed up the return of plentiful supplies of soap to the grocers' shelves."

Both the OPA and the agriculture department said there was no plan to ration soap despite the fat shortage. They said the current shortage should be eased by a recent order permitting soap manufacturers to make 78 percent of their 1941 output instead of the present 74.
