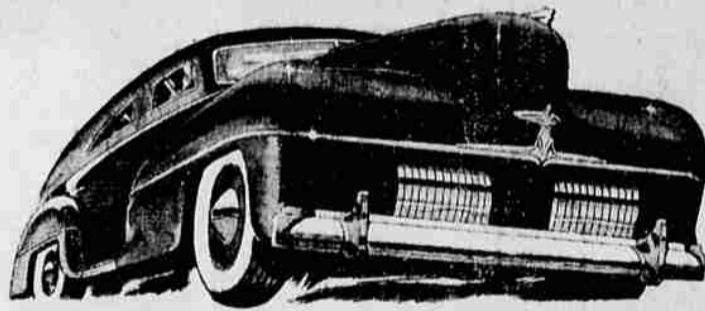
Five tables of pinochle were played, with first going to Mrs. Charles Hoak and fourth to Mrs. Arch Richard Strand.

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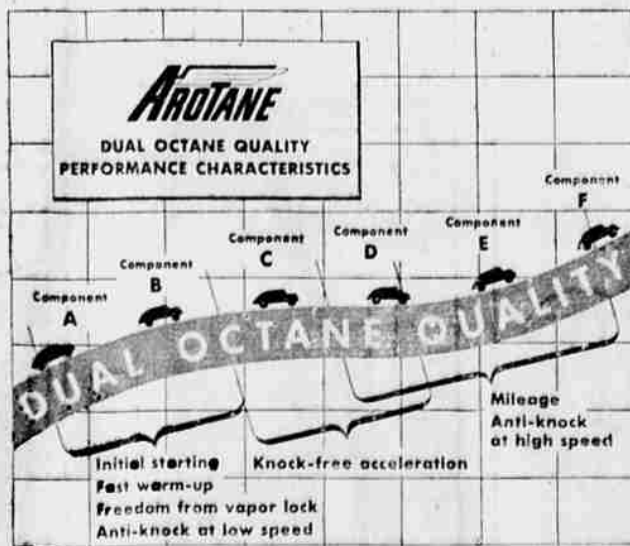
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
