Proclamation for 'Religious' Week

Ministers Condemn Horse, Dog Races

PORTLAND, Sept. 29 (UP)—Gambling in connection with dog and horse racing was condemned in a resolution distributed today by the Portland Council of Churches.

Adopted by the council and distributed by Rev. I. George Nace, executive secretary, the resolution declared the council of churches "deplored the increase of gambling in the community in connection with dog and horse racing" and its "unfortunate effect upon the moral and spiritual life of the community."

The church group recommended an educational campaign for elimination of state laws permitting gambling in connection with racing.
