Stock Prices Off, Dealing Slackens

NEW YORK, Oct. 3 (UP)—Stock prices were irregularly lower today, extending yesterday's late reaction. Dealings slackened.

The bulk of the selling was interpreted in Wall Street as wholly of a profit-taking nature. Although the trend was down, some selective buying developed.

Coca-Cola was up 5 to a 1945 high and gains in airlines ranged to nearly 7 points in United preferred. Schenley was up almost 4 points.

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Jack Peare Looks Back on 55 Years Of Residence Here

(Continued from Page 1)
beyond 19th street. He recalled that at that time most of the business district was on Third street, with a little on Morrison and Washington street only then starting. St. Vincents was there but much smaller than the present establishment.

His first job in this country was in a Eugene jewelry store, where he remained until October, then moved to La Grande. Upon his arrival here Peare took employment with C. G. Bunie, now a resident of Portland, and remained with him until Nov. 1891 at which time he started business for himself.

With a tailor named Ross he moved from his location (where the Sommer building now stands) to the front part of his present site, with Ross occupying the back portion of the building. Later W. B. Sargent rented half the front of the building for the original La Grande investment company.

When Sargent moved, Peare took the whole building which has housed his jewelry store since. Two years ago the firm bought the building which it has occupied for almost 55 years. Peare and Clint Van Fleet built the first modern store fronts in La Grande.

When he came here, Peare says, the town boasted two brick buildings, one occupied by Roger and Wells on the corner of what is now the Berry building, and the La Grande National bank had a small brick building in its present location. He has seen La Grande burn and rebuild twice.

Fire Chief
In the early days, Peare, for many years was chief of the fire department. The group was entirely volunteer. He was the organizer of the La Grande hose team that held tournaments each year at which the fire brigades of eastern Oregon and Washington, including La Grande, Baker, Pendleton, Walla Walla, Colfax, Watsburg and Hepper, competed in races.

One of the last competitions of the group was held at Dayton and La Grande won all the races. That same team tied the world's record for 200 yards with hose cart carrying 500 feet of hose, with their time 23 seconds.

His Own Colors
He coached La Grande high school team before the town could afford to pay a coach and thus did La Grande acquire its colors of blue and white, his colors brought from Ireland where each contestant had separate colors.

He trained his son, William Peare, whose record of two minutes and two seconds for the 880 yard run made in 1910, still stands untied in eastern Oregon.

Football, cricket, bicycle races, rowboat races and every sport in Ireland were among his athletic activities before leaving his native land. He competed for all round championship of the world in Dublin in 1888 or '89 against two competitors from America.

To continue with his athletics after coming to this country he competed at the first meeting
