DETROIT, Oct. 2 (UP)—Two off-fired guys who came back the hard way were striding toward the world series today for a knock-down drag-out battle which will put one of them on the top of the baseball heap.

One is left-handed, banjo-playing Dutchman with a shock of graying brown hair who is known affectionately to his Chicago Cubs as Jolly Cholly Grimm.

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 3 (UP)—A slim field of 75 golfers, the nation's top flight professionals and amateurs, opened the last round of practice swings today before bucking down to business in the four-day \$10,500 Tacoma open.

Dominating the field in tomorrow's teoff, are pro-golf's big four—Sammy Snead, Hunt Springs, Va., Byron Nelson, Toledo, O.; Harold (Jug) McSpaden, Sanford, Me. and Ben Hogan, Hershey, Pa.

Flanked by an array of coast-to-coast talent, the big money boys slammed up and down the par 70 Fircrest golf club fairways yesterday in the first test rounds. Nelson and Snead carded unofficial 67s and McSpaden limped in with a 71.

Hogan, who shattered all time PGA tournament records by chalking up 261 at Portland, was noncommittal.

"I didn't keep score," he explained. "I was just limbering up."
