Profit Taking Hits Stocks, Trade Rises

NEW YORK, Oct. 2 (UP)—A burst of profit-taking came into the stock market just before closing time today, turning the list irregular after the general advance had been carried to new highs since 1937. Trading increased sharply on the decline and many issues appeared on large blocks.

Steels were hard hit by the selling. Bethlehem dropped from a new high of 92½ to close at 90½ off 1½. U. S. Steel which hit a high of 77¼ closed at 75¼ off 2¼. Chrysler dropped from 126 to 124 off 1½ net.

Cherry Industry Brings \$200,000 Revenue in Year

Union county has long been known for fine cherries and in recent years they have been reaching the market in increasing volume. For many years Cove was the center of this activity and still produces a large quantity, but large plantings made 15 years ago in the Imbler and Summerville sections have tended to make large producers of those sections too.

In the earlier years of the cherry growing industry, the marketing of the fruit was all through cash buyers who bought the fruit from the growers, packed it, and shipped it to the auction market in the east. Karl Stackland of Cove was long prominent in this activity.

The growers, however, were not satisfied with this method and 25 years ago at Cove formed a cooperative agency to pack and market their fruit. A similar group was formed in Union shortly afterward. Both of these agencies contracted the services of R. H. Monahan of Freewater and this arrangement was continued until the death of Monahan in 1942.

In 1928 and 1929 cherries were in strong demand, and prices received by the growers encouraged an expansion. Additional plantings were made in the Cove district but by this time the Pumpkin Ridge area near Imbler and Summerville had also shown its adaptability. The Elgin district also received some attention. As production from these orchards increased the growers there also formed a cooperative to pack and market their fruit, and they, too, contracted with Monahan.

Probably the most encouraging factor for Union county cherry growers is that, with the exception of a small area in Montana, cherries grown here are the latest sweet cherries grown in the United States.

In dollar value, cherries do not compare with a few of the more generally grown crops here. The 1944 crop was probably the largest grown for years and brought something over \$250,000. The 1945 crop was slightly less, with \$200,000 being paid.

Harvesting of cherries is largely done by transients, who do nothing but pick fruit, at the harvest season comes at a time when there is almost no other fruit ready for harvesting. Pickers come here in large numbers, and no difficulty has been encountered in securing as many as needed.

cause the writing. I wish you could see this country from the air, it certainly is beautiful. I may stay in this country for a short time helping out, for I speak Japanese fairly well and know the customs of the people. It has been a tough experience but a good one in many ways. I will write as often as possible and let you know what is going on.

Don't worry. Everyone of the men are all right except Don Miller from Cove, he was killed the morning we surrendered on Wake. Pete (meaning Pete Russell) was separated from us so I don't know about him.

Fukuyoka is about burned out. B-29s, about 60 of them, came over at night and really messed it up. The camp was not touched because it was on the outskirts of the city. Now that the tables are reversed the Japanese are quite hospitable. Their country is in terrible shape, no food or clothing to speak of and most of the cities are in ruins. Well we should be landing soon. Best wishes and will be seeing you soon.

Napoleon. Paris is beautiful. The architecture is fairly uniform and there are few ugly buildings."

At Festival

Written two days later, Aug. 29 — "I attended a festival here, a part of the 1945 Festival—the resurrected music festival here. I was surprised that I could understand so much German.

We are making feverish preparations for a hard winter. It is reported there comes lots of snow here and becomes very cold. It must be so, when the Danube which flows at a rate of six or seven knots freezes over."

Later—"I did take about three hours off Sunday afternoon to drive to Berchtesgaden to see Hitler's, Goering's etc. playground and Hitler's lair. This is on top of a 9,000 foot peak. For mountains I can say I have seen none prettier. The scenery is simply grand.

New Medal

"Tonight I got word that I am being transferred to Vienna area command as G-5. This means chief civil affairs office for Vienna. My old commanding officer, Brigadier General Tate is there as chief of staff for U. S. forces in Austria. Suppose he is responsible for my being called there."

Awaiting Colonel Eberhard on his return was another medal. He is now a Knight of the Order of St. Maurice and St. Lazarus, an Italian order. If the constitution did not forbid, he would have been given the title "baron." The ribbon which represents the medal is green with a small silver crown affixed.

Four Deer Hunters Killed so Far in 1945 Hunting Season

PORTLAND, Oct. 2 (UP)—The death of Floyd Motter, Albany, brought Oregon's toll of deer hunters for the 1945 season to four today.

Motter died at a Lebanon hospital Monday night from a gunshot wound received Sunday when shot for a deer by a fellow hunter. His death was the first hunting fatality in Linn county in five years.

A La Grande woman, wounded as she sat with her husband and friends around a campfire in preparation for the season's opening, was the first fatality.

Other victims, both killed Sunday were Clint Looney, 55, Estacada, lumber contractor, found fatally wounded near Magoon lake in eastern Oregon; and Harry James White, 65, Salem, shot on the Willamette valley ranch of John J. Schmitze.
