Tillamook Burn Will Become Symbol of Restoration Work by Man After Fires

SALEM, Oct. 4 (UP)—Tillamook burn, which has become a symbol of forest fire destruction, may gain distinction as one of man's greatest gardens. The state forestry department has preliminary plans to transform this 133,000-acre area into a green land of tall timber.

According to state forester Nels Rogers, the reforestation program will be started this winter.

Edge of the burn near Cochrane has been chosen as the site for the first tree planting work. The few snags in this part of the burn will be felled.

Good Chance

First trees will be planted early in December by crews using the Miller tree planter, a gadget devised by S. L. Miller of the state forestry department. Experienced hands can plant as many as 250 seedlings an hour with the Miller planter and tests have proved survival of trees planted with the instrument is equal to that of trees set out carefully by hand.

Seeding is more of a delicate operation, successful direct seeding requires a site free of rodents. Previous experiments show rodents will strip a newly-seeded area almost as soon as it is sown.

Uncertain

Most uncertain phase of the program is the plan to use airplanes for seeding seeds.

The state will seed a section of the burn from the air. A variety of seeds will be used and tests will be made in two years to determine the value of the method. If it proves successful, larger areas will be seeded from the air.

Forestry crews are gathering seed cones in preparation for the winter reforestation project. Two thousand pounds of Douglas fir seeds and 800 to 1,000 pounds of Port Orford cedar seeds will be needed to start. It is estimated 4,000 bushels of cones will be needed.

Baby Born on Way To Hospital at 105 Miles an Hour

SEATTLE, Oct. 4 (UP)—A six pound, nine-ounce boy was doing fine today after being born in a speeding ambulance en route to King county hospital. The mother, Mrs. Gayne Leblanc, 20-year-old wife of Air Cadet Jack Leblanc, in training in Texas, was also doing fine hospital attaches reported.

Charles Dawson, ambulance driver, said the speedometer of the vehicle crept to 105 miles per hour as he rushed mother and her new son to the hospital.

The Globster left Hamilton Field carrying a crew of eight and about 35 passengers and cargo.

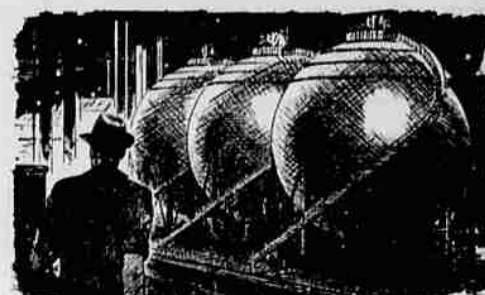
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
