Markets

Stocks Advance But Irregularly

NEW YORK, Oct. 4 (UP)—Stocks made an irregular advance in moderate trading today, featured by liquor issues with gains ranging to more than 3 points.

A long list of special issues moved up 1 to 5 points. Baking issues generally made new highs. Some airlines were strong. Utilities were active in the low-priced group.

Pressure relaxed soon after an irregularly lower opening. However profit-taking came into leading issues and near closing some of the gains were being whittled from the leaders.

Portland, Oct. 4 (UP)—Bus operations in all the far western states were in jeopardy today as a strike Overland Greyhound and Pacific Trailways drivers in the Pacific northwest threatened to spread into the Pacific Greyhound system.

Constitution meetings broke down between company officials and the 300 striking drivers of Overland Greyhound and 50 for Pacific Trailways. The union gave Pacific Greyhound until midnight tonight to accept demands. A strike on this system could paralyze bus travel in Oregon, California, Utah, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico and Texas.

Union Must Get Wage Demands or Else Says Leader

striking oil workers international union (CIO) said the 6,000 strikers in the Calumet area of northern Indiana will not go back to work in government - operated plants, unless their demands are met.

The plan to seize the oil companies for government operation was announced last night after all but one of 11 oil companies rejected a proposal for arbitration.

PORTLAND, Oct. 4 (UP)—Removal of pickets by court order today permitted almost normal operation at CIO-affiliated lumber plants in the Pacific northwest, with AFL unionists continuing their strike in nearly 500 plants.

It was reported full crews were back at work in the Long Bell and Weyerhaeuser Timber company plants at Longview, Wash., two of the biggest lumber operations in the world. The AFL brought a temporary closure Tuesday with picket lines, which later were removed by court orders secured by the CIO.
