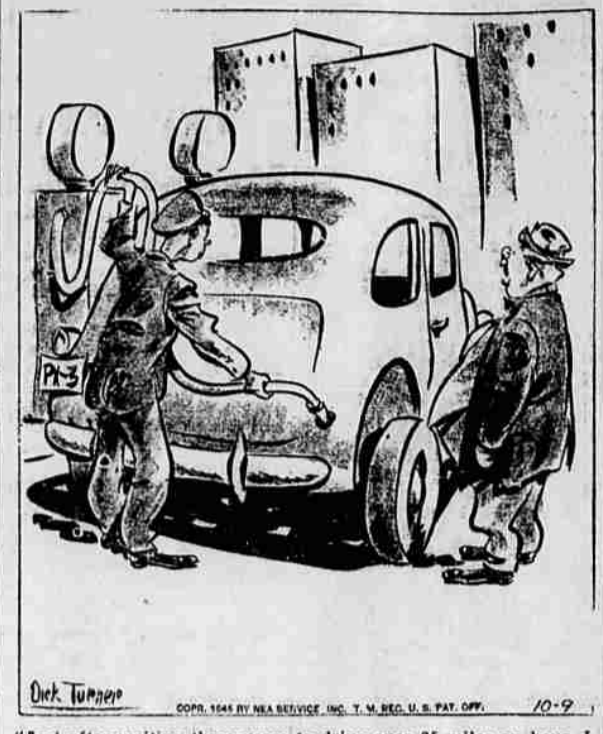

## Markets

### Industrial Climb To New High Ground

NEW YORK, Oct. 8 (UP)—Industrial shares again led the stock market into new high ground for more than eight years today with volume increasing.

A long list gained one to more than two points. Steel, automobile, department store, aircraft, tobacco, and amusement issues were in the forefront. Rails joined the rise and the rail equipment also moved ahead.

Demand for stocks was based on a bright outlook for the post-reconversion period and hence traders paid only passing attention to strikes and other current problems. Leading steels made new highs despite a drop of more than 7 per cent in steel output caused by coal mining stoppages.

## Howard Fisk Shoots Deer Here With Bow, 2 Well Aimed Arrows

First deer brought down by bow and arrow in this area since the Indians adopted the white man's weapons went to the credit of Howard Fisk of La Grande who yesterday shot a 150 pound three-point buck with two well placed arrows north of Medical Springs.

With four other men, Fisk had started out for a day's stalk. Jerry Welchko wounded the animal slightly but it took to the brush. Fisk and his companions started in pursuit and Fisk came upon the animal in a clearing, about 35 yards distant.

His first arrow brought the animal down and the second finished him.

With Fisk were Welchko, Dan Turley, Carl Stone and Ray Anderson. Fisk shoots a hunting bow with a 60-pound pull. So far as is known he is the first to bag a deer in this area with bow and arrow.

## Winds Whip Fire In Neahkahnie State Forest

NEHALEM, Oct. 8 (UP)—Easterly winds whipped up a smoldering blaze in the Neahkahnie mountain state forest today, carrying the blaze over several hundred acres to threaten highways U. S. 101.

Flames were speedily stripping the area of all previous scenic beauty. Fire crews were standing by with residents of the beach municipalities of Neahkahnie and Manzanita to protect property.

Forestry officials were attempting to keep the highway open for traffic, while at the same time trying to fence the blaze in. The fire started several days ago in logging slash.

## FLAMES SWEEPING COLUMBIA FOREST

VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 8 (UP)—Flames were sweeping over more than 1,000 acres of the Columbia national forest, northeast of here, as a strong east wind whipped up the fire today.

The fire, starting Sunday, was raging between Gumbolt lookout and the Tatoosh hills. Only 85 men were reported fighting the fire, which was blown from snag to snag by a hot, dry wind, and forest service officials were clamoring for more help.

## Hess Returns to Germany for Trial

LONDON, Oct. 8 (UP)—Rudolf Hess, former deputy fuhrer of the Nazi party who flew to Britain on a fantastic mission in 1941, left by plane for Germany today to stand trial as a war criminal.

Hess, unkempt and thin, left Madeley air field near Aberystwyth, Wales, for Frankfurt at 8:50 a.m. He was escorted by an army guard, a medical officer, an attendant and an official of the United Nations war crimes commission.

His departure was one of a swift series of events clearing the way for the mass trials of Axis war criminals at Nuernberg. Allied officials are conferring at Berlin on plans for the trials.

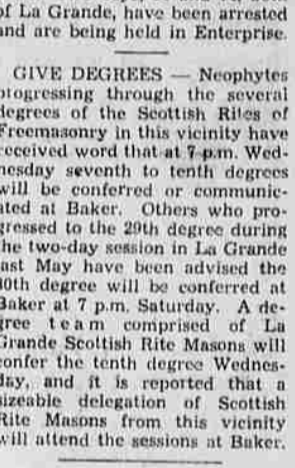
