Some of the flotilla's ships have been assigned occupational duties, now that the Jap garrisons have surrendered.

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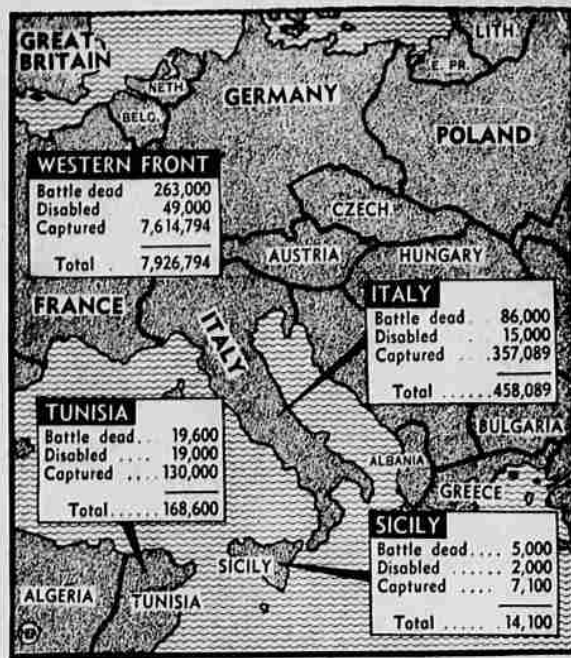

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Your GI Rights Problems of Men In Service

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Here are some general questions from veterans and their relatives:

Q. My husband was 24 years old when he went into the army in 1941. Now he is 28 and still has two more years of college before he can get his degree. That will make him 30 or 31 years old before he can start looking for a job. Is there any provision for speeding up his education or getting a shorter course for him?

A. It is possible that some of the training he had while in the army would give him additional credit toward graduation. Many colleges now are considering a speeded-up set of courses for veterans.

Q. Would it be possible for me to go to school for a year before claiming my reinstatement rights to the job I had before I was drafted?

A. No you have to apply for reinstatement within 90 days of your discharge from the service.

Q. Is it true that the government will give an American flag to the family of a dead veteran, for draping over his casket?

A. Yes. Application must be made to postmasters at any county seat post office or any other post office designated by the Veterans Administration, or any field office of the Veterans Administration. The flag shall be given to the next of kin after burial.

Q. How much money does a veteran get from the government while he is getting vocational rehabilitation?

A. During the training period and for two months after employment is determined, a single person receives pension at the rate of \$80 a month; a married person \$90 a month with \$5 a month for each dependent child and an additional allowance of \$10 a month for each dependent parent.

Truman Bent on Keeping Atomic Bomb U. S. Secret

TIPTONVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 9 (UP)—President Truman is firmly determined to keep from any other nation of the world, including all our wartime allies, the highly guarded secret of how the United States manufactured atomic bombs.

He favors, however, wide interchange of scientific knowledge regarding atomic energy in the hope it will lead to a new era of world wide prosperity and peace. The president today bided his time on restful, sprawling Reelfoot lake, but last night, smiling and happy after a big fish dinner, the president jerked this holiday in Tennessee out of the category of a newsless vacation by announcing:

1. This country has no intention of sharing with any nation the secret know-how of the manufacturing processes used in atomic bomb production.

2. Present unrest between wide segments of labor and management in this country is the natural result of a post-war let-down, but he was not worried about it, confident that with co-operation and understanding this country will move forward to its most glorious era.

3. He is not worried about the international situation and, on the question of current difficulties with Russia, he cited the long-standing friendship between this country and the Soviet Union.

4. The president thinks this country and the world face the greatest era in history.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (UP)—Rep. James W. Mott, R., Ore., was reported to be "recovering nicely" from an operation at Bethesda naval hospital.

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Grimm Plans to Put Borowy on Mound

CHICAGO, Oct. 9 (UP)—Manager Charlie Grimm of the Chicago Cubs decided today to gamble with an old Detroit nemesis and named Hank Borowy to pitch tomorrow in the seventh game of the world series.

Borowy, who will be shooting for his third victory in the post season classic, will be opposed by Hal Newhouser, the southpaw ace of the Tigers.

Pordham Hank won 11 and lost two for the Cubs after they bought him from the New York Yankees in midseason for \$100,000. If he is the winning or losing pitcher he will set a record. No other pitcher has ever figured in three consecutive world series decisions.

Hard put for pitching strength, Grimm decided to go with Borowy rather than the veteran Paul Derringer, who is the only well-rested pitcher the Cubs have. He was hoping Borowy once more would be able to continue the jinx he has held over the Tigers. Before Borowy was sold out of the American league he had defeated the Tigers 11 times while losing to them only three. So that record, with his world series decisions, means Pordham Hank has beaten the Bengals 13 times while

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 9 (UP)—United States players, led by national champion Frank Parker and Mrs. Patricia Todd, moved into advanced rounds of the Pan-American tennis tournament today.

Parker, top-seeded in the visiting men's class, won his first match yesterday, 6-2, 3-5, over Alfredo Ramos of Mexico. Francisco Segura, the little Ecuadorian who is the defending Pan-American champion, moved into the third round with a 6-2, 6-2 conquest of Paul Vincent of the U. S. A.

Heraldo Weiss, Argentine champion, defeated Octavio Martinez of Mexico, 6-4, 6-2.

Mrs. Todd advanced to the third round in the women's division by beating Raquel de Martinez, 6-2, 6-0, and Dorothy Head of California, ousted the Mexican women's titlist, Hilda Heyne, 7-5, 2-6, 6-1. Mary Arnold of Los Angeles eliminated Elvira de Ampudia of Mexico, 6-1, 6-1.

Greenberg Not to Get Credit for Error on Play

CHICAGO, Oct. 9 (UP)—Hammerin' Hank Greenberg, a ball player for the sports reporters today—from about 400 guys who did not want to see the big Detroit outfielder crucified as the "goat" of the 1945 world series.

These writers, veteran typewriters or punchers who have written thousands of words about that "slugging Greenberg boy" up solidly in their protests against the official scorers who charged Greenberg with an error in the 12th inning of yesterday's game, permitting the Cubs to win, 8 to 7, and squaring the series at three games apiece.

The various writers, assembled here to cover baseball's classic, "kicked" so vehemently, the three official scorers reversed their decision, cleansing Greenberg's hands.

The questionable play came in the last half of the 12th inning when the Cubs at bat and the score tied 7-all. Pinch runner Billy Schuster was on first base when Stan Hack rifled a single to left field. The ball took a crazy bounce, jumping over Greenberg's head and rolling to the left field wall about 365 feet from home plate as Schuster scampered home with the "big run"—the game winner and the one that gave the Cubs a ticket into the final game tomorrow.
