

TODAY'S SPORT PARADE

CHICAGO, Oct. 10 (UP)—Albert Benjamin (Happy) Chandler was on his way out of the U. S. senate today to nail down the \$50,000-a-year job as baseball commissioner which an under-cover campaign was threatening to take away from him.

Throughout the current world series, Happy has been earning the nickname of Slap-Happy as he dodged a shower of bricks, bats, bouquets were noticeably absent.

To Keep Job
"They voted me into the job and I'm going to keep it," Happy said vehemently as he wrestled adjectives with sportswriters last night.

"The club owners put no time limit on when I could resign from the senate and become full-time commissioner, so I stayed in the senate because there were a number of important bills which I wanted to introduce. I now have tendered my resignation to the governor of Kentucky, Simon S. Willis, and it is only fitting he should announce the date."

Incidentally, the date is expected to be Nov. 1, but Happy left no doubt he is making a speedy exit from the senatorial chambers and that he was keeping the \$50,000-a-year job as commissioner.

Quit Jumping
That is that. But for a while yesterday it looked like maybe it wouldn't be. The club owners and their representatives attending the series held separate sessions and then a joint meeting at which, one report had it, they pleaded with Chandler to quit jumping from one job to another.

It followed by a day a secret session in which the owners met to consider reports they were preparing to buy up Chandler's contract. Their studied decision was that there was "no basis of fact" to the stories.

But you couldn't miss the fact that somebody was shooting straight at the glad-hand guy from the Bluegrass, a target practice which has been going on ever since his election.

45,000 Waited
The informers have delighted in pointing out Chandler had a preference commotion with the umpires when he attempted to usurp their authority; that he took it on himself to keep newspapermen out of dressing rooms and he attended a political luncheon in Detroit while 45,000 fans waited in the rain for his decision whether the game would be played.

Yet the squeeze play really must have worked. Because Happy finally is tossing aside his senatorial post, on what apparently is a quick decision. The betting in the world series marls is that Chandler was told to jump one way or the other — and to leap without taking time to look too thoroughly.

Head Injuries Fatal To Young Fighter

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 10 (UP)—Alberto Silva, 22-year-old featherweight boxer, died early today, apparently from head injuries suffered in a bout at Ocean Park arena Monday night. Silva died in general hospital barely 24 hours after the referee ruled him a victim of a technical knockout.

Felix Miramontes, Los Angeles gold-cloves featherweight champion, had pounded Silva severely around the head when the fight was stopped.

Series Tickets Selling for \$100 In Mad Chicago

CHICAGO, Oct. 10 (UP)—Anybody with a seat for the seventh and final world series game could sell it for \$100 in Chicago today.

With the 1945 world series scheduled for a climactic ending at Wrigley field today, Chicago is a baseball-crazy town. A box seat, originally priced at \$7.20, was selling for as much as \$150 in the lobbies of several of the leading hotels. Baseball fans were waving \$100 bills at cab drivers and bell hops in the hope they could get a grandstand spot. And in local bars and restaurants, arguments raged over whether Manager Charlie Grimm was wise in sending Hank Borowy to the mound for the Cubs with only one day of rest.

Brooklyn fans long have been considered the nuttiest horsehide lovers in baseball. But their reputation was being ruined today by some 70,000 fans who all wanted to squeeze into the 43,000 seating capacity of Wrigley field. Unreserved bleacher seats 5,000 of them, and 2,500 standing room tickets went on sale at 7 a. m. today and were immediately gobbled up. Fans with blankets and chairs began lining up before the bleacher ticket windows at 5 p. m. yesterday. Anybody who arrived at midnight was out of luck—the line had grown that long.

Box and grandstand seats went on sale yesterday at 8 a. m. and were sold in three hours.

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Sportsmen in Favor Of Closed Streams

Various plans for improving the fishing in the streams of this area were advanced last night at a meeting of the Sportsmen's club, at which more than 50 were present for the purpose of discussing resolutions to be forwarded to the state game commission.

Most of the suggestions favored closing some of the streams each year, in rotation. It was also suggested the Grande Ronde river and tributaries be closed above Five Points after Aug. 1 each year, because of low water.

A fish hatchery for Union, Baker, or Umatilla county also was suggested.

Marsden Walker reported three loads of fish have been stocked in streams here recently, two in the Grande Ronde and one in Catherine creek. The fish are rainbow trout and averaged three inches in length. There was about 15,000 in each load.

Howard Fisk discussed the food supplies for fingerlings. Fisk, formerly of the state police, was the first local bowman to report killing a deer with bow and arrow. The deer was hit by two well placed arrows, following a rifle slug through the lungs and liver.

Another member of the club reported he had heard reports and had seen hunters near here shooting pheasants along the roadsides with 22 caliber rifles.

It was pointed out this is triply illegal — shooting from the highway, hunting upland game birds with rifles and shooting pheasants out of season all being forbidden.

President Ernie Walden reported on the annual dinner at the city park earlier in the month. It was attended by nearly 200 persons.
