Joseph Lyman Spencer, pharmacist, second class, stationed in the Solomon Islands area. He is the 23-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Spencer of La Grande. Spencer attended elementary school at Liberty school, high school in La Grande, and was a student at Eastern Oregon college when he entered the service in February, 1943.



Returning with the famous 43rd division from action on Luzon and duty as occupation troops in Japan is Pfc. Alvin W. Campbell, whose wife resides at 1105 Eleventh street, La Grande. Campbell was inducted into the service of his country Oct. 4, 1944, and left the United States in March, 1945, arriving on Luzon May 5, in time to participate in the late stages of that difficult campaign.

He was awarded the Bronze Star medal for heroic action under fire and also wears the combat infantryman's badge, Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with one star and the Philippine liberation ribbon with one star.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11 (UP)—A typhoon which has deluged Tokyo with rain for the past three days left 69 known dead, 128 houses destroyed, 81 bridges washed out and nearly 1,000 acres of land flooded in central and southern Honshu, a broadcast quoting the Japanese home ministry said today.
