Tigers Get Biggest World Series Cut

DETROIT, Oct. 11 (UP)—Those roaring Tigers roared into Detroit today with their first world's baseball title in 10 years and fresh money jingling in their pockets.

Given a rousing welcome at the Union station last night, the Tigers tonight will officially receive the thanks of the city for winning the world series when they attend a lavish dinner presented by the chamber of commerce.

Each of the 31 Tiger players, who were voted a full world series share, will receive about \$6,445. The Tiger team, in all, received \$199,799.88 from the players' pool or 60 percent, the winner's share.

Meanwhile, in Chicago, 33½ shares were doled out to the Cubs. Each share was worth about \$4,277.

Young Fitz, Kahut Battle Natural For Portland

PORTLAND, Oct. 11 (UP)—When two young dynamic fistic personalities, containing the sock and showmanship that makes for boxing champions, clash at the cross-roads of their fight careers—boxing promoters call that match a "natural."

It will be just that when 22-year-old Joe Kahut, popular Oregon champ, trades punches Friday night in Portland auditorium with 23-year-old Fitz Fitzpatrick, Los Angeles and West Virginia knockout specialist.

Both lads have been in the fight game a comparatively short time, but during the interval have made enviable records. Their numerous kayo victories have been achieved in a similar manner.

In fact, each fighter has lost two battles—and each lost one of these to the veteran Lloyd Marshall, Sacramento, Calif., negro star.

For Joe Waterman the fight is a promoter's dream. In home territory young Kahut is a top gate attraction. It was only a little while ago the navy lad was fighting for \$50 purses. But in his last bout with dusky Al Jordan, the Woodburn, Ore., youngster kayoed the negro in the fifth round to win a purse of \$2,500.

TODAY'S SPORT PARADE

CHICAGO, Oct. 11 (UP)—Paul Rapier Richards, the tired Tiger catcher whose first inning double wrapped up the 1945 world series, limped back to Texas today to "just sit and watch those pecans grow."

Richards was an outstanding member of the "eight old men" from Detroit who finished the business of skinning the Chicago Cubs yesterday. And take it from Paul, he, at least, just made it.

"If there had been one more game—or maybe even one more inning—I don't think I'd have made it," Paul said as he slumped down in front of his locker in the riotous Tiger dressing room.

No Part
Paul took no part in the wild celebration and even ignored Hank Greenberg who, instead of thinking about the world championship just won, was griping about scorers who marked an error against him in the 12-inning loss two days before.

Although he was the man who had done the most to win the championship for the Tigers in this final game, Paul quietly threaded his way to the showers, acknowledging congratulations in his pleasant and almost surprised way. Richards wanted to go home.

It was the end of his greatest season—and possibly of his playing career. Getting to this point was more than the worrisome guy ever had dreamed of and it was one of those once-in-a-million happenings.

Hired in 1943
Because Richards was just a minor league manager three years ago after knocking around with Brooklyn, the Giants and the Athletics. He had been managing Atlanta four years, and doing a bangup job, when the Tigers hired him in 1943 as a coach. Then came the break which, long after Richards had resigned himself, was to make him one of the brightest stars in the game.

Dixie Parsons was slated to do the Tiger catching in 1943 and when he came up with a lame arm, Paul suddenly found himself behind the mask with a mitt on his hand. He's been there ever since, with his unorthodox stance of projecting one leg because of an old injury, and it paid off in a pennant for the Tigers.

It was Richards who steadied the Bengal pitchers; who tamed young Hal Newhouse, once a Tiger terror, and who in addition always was right there in the clutch. A sport, for instance, as in the first inning yesterday when, with three men on base, Richards came through with the double that cleared the bases and broke the Cubs' collective backs. After that one, Chicago's hopes were wrecked and the Cubs knew it.

After severely mauling Albany, Marshfield and Eugene in three successive weeks of football play, the Medford Black Tornadoes entertain the Eureka, Calif., Loggers Friday night in an interstate struggle which is expected to give the Medford lads victory No. 4.

Already well on their way to their second straight Oregon high school football championship, the Medford stalwarts are expected to make short work of their California opponents.

Co-starring with the Medford-Eureka game for the week-end prep football spotlight will be clash between the McMinnville Grizzlies and the Hillsboro Spartans.

Good Backs
Both teams are unbeaten and untied and feature two of the state's finest high school ball carriers in the persons of Quarterback George Allison of McMinnville and speedy Jack Doyle of Hillsboro.

The no-name league footballers go into their third round of action this week when Corvallis, winner of two league tilts, jaunts to Portland to play the central Catholic Rams. The Eugene Axemen take on the win-less Albany Bulldogs, and the Salem Vikings entertain Bend.

Another important game will see the undefeated Hood River squad go to Gresham.

To Gresham
In eastern Oregon, the Pendleton Buckaroos travel to La Grande in an attempt to convince a La Grande 11 of their football prowess, while Prineville travels to The Dalles and Mac-High entrains to Clarkston, Wash., Nyssa jaunts to Payette, Ida., Vale travels to Emmet, Ida., and Hood River comes to Gresham after drubbing Prineville 42 to 12 last week.

In other featured week-end tilts Roseburg entertains a Springfield 11 in its bid to keep in the state championship race, Wauke goes to Astoria, and Beaverton to Tillamook.

100,000 Hunters To Open Season On Game Birds

PORTLAND, Oct. 11 (UP)—Some 100,000 nimrods are expected to invade Oregon woods next Saturday when Oregon's annual hunting season for upland game birds and migratory waterfowl starts officially.

Game commission authorities report China pheasants in the Willamette valley will be 50 percent less than last year.

In Malheur county, where the pheasants usually abound, the birds are expected to show a sharp decrease because of rainy weather during nesting periods. Identical predictions are made for Hungarian partridges and quail.

Duck and goose hunting will not be good until the migrants are blown out of the northlands by a storm. Warm weather in the Canadian breeding areas is expected to keep the webfeet there for several weeks.

Oregon Stars Out With Leg Injuries

Tigers Show O'Neill Good for Big Time

CHICAGO, Oct. 11 (UP)—The Detroit Tigers came to the end of the 1945 major league baseball season today, carrying with them the world series gold and glory on a wing and a prayer.

It proved their boss, Burly Steve O'Neill had come back and made good in the big time.

And the boys who were instrumental in that success are O'Neill's wing and prayer. The wing is that of left-handed Hal Newhouse who climaxed a brilliant season yesterday by defeating the Cubs 9 to 3 in the seventh and deciding game of this richest series.

Filled Breach
The prayer was catcher Paul Richards, far past his prime but called upon to fill the breach when service calls out baseball manpower.

Richards was in the minors when O'Neill decided to take a chance on the veteran while praying fervently the 36-year-old Richards would hold up.

Steve's prayers were not in vain. Richards' handling of pitchers played a big part in the Detroit success and his bat yesterday boomed out the base hit that brought the Tigers their second world series victory in seven tries. Their previous victims were the Cubs, 10 years ago.

Rough Loss
It was rough losing for Chicago, but it was generally agreed they lost to a better ball club. Once more it was a story of American league power going for a big inning over the tight defensive play of the National league.

Fordham Hank Borowy went out in an attempt to match the record of seven other hurlers who have won world series games but that one day of rest between the sixth and seventh games was not enough. Instead of winding up with his 14th victory over the Tigers, he came out of it with his fifth defeat.

It was the old story with Newhouse coming through. All season long he had been O'Neill's man in the clutch. And the 25 victories he turned in meant the pennant for the Tigers.

Failed in First
Newhouse had failed O'Neill in the first game when he lost to Borowy but he came back to beat Fordham Hank, 8 to 4, in the fifth game. And yesterday, when thousand-dollar bills were riding on every pitch, he again showed the pitching magic.

It wasn't of course, all Newhouse and Detroit. Guys like Hank Greenberg, Doc Cramer, Skeeter Webb, Eddie Mayo, Virgil Trucks and Dizzy Trout did their part, too. But without Newhouse and Richards it probably would have been a different story.

There was no outstanding hero in the series and no outstanding goat. Newhouse, Greenberg and
