Few throwouts 4-H club steers \$18.00-16.50; week's top steers \$18.50; odd cutter heifers \$8.75; canner-cutter cows salable \$8.00-7.50; medium beef cows up to \$10.50; medium-gross calves \$11.00-13.00; choice vealers quotable up to \$14.00.

Hogs, none. Quotable steady. Barrows and gilts salable \$15.80; sows \$15.05; choice under 100 lb. feeder pigs held around \$18.50.

Sheep 25. Good-choice lambs lacking. Salable \$12.00-12.50; week's extreme top \$13.00; good ewes \$4.00.

CHICAGO, Oct. 12 (UP) — Hogs 2,500. Active, fully steady. Good and choice barrows and gilts 140 lbs.; up at \$14.85, new ceiling price. Good and choice sows at \$14.10. Complete clearance.

Convicts Die From Drinking Poison

SAN QUENTIN, Calif., Oct. 12 (UP) — Three San Quentin convicts are dead and nine are ill, today from drinking a poisonous fluid used to operate a duplicating machine. Warden Clinton Duffy reported.

Artis Clark, 34, convicted in San Diego county for illegal possession of narcotics in May, 1945, died last night in the prison hospital. His death followed those of Robert Henderson, 29, and Joseph G. Davis, 30, both of Los Angeles.

Fuffy said some of the other nine men in the hospital were in pretty bad shape. Two were believed to be critically ill.

OBJECTOR WINS WAR'S HIGHEST AWARD—Believed to be the first conscientious objector to win the nation's highest award for valor, Pfc. Desmond T. Egg Market up, But Poultry Meat Prices Unsettled

Egg markets turned slightly stronger during the week ending Oct. 10, but poultry meats reflected curtailed government buying and heavier marketings. Turkeys moved at good prices.

The United States average farm price of turkeys at mid-September was 33 3/5 cents a pound, liveweight. That was two and one-half cents higher than a year previous and more than twice the 1935-1939 average.

Turkey dressing operations are becoming general in the Willamette valley and northern areas of Oregon. Plants are mostly operating at or near capacity. Prices are fairly well defined at 36 to 38 cents for young hens and 37 cents for young toms. Growers net 2 4/5 cents less which is the charge for killing, hauling, and dressing.

Additional shipments of mid-western box-packed chickens were received at Portland and other Pacific coast markets during the past week. Prices have held generally at or near ceilings, although leghorn hens declined one cent at Portland. Offerings of fryers and roasters increased and the market registered a weaker tone.

Washington Steer Win International

PORTLAND, Oct. 12 (UP) — Wayne Nenhard, Deer Park, Wash., entered an Aberdeen Angus steer that won the grand championship of the beef cattle division of the 35th annual Pacific International Livestock Exposition, which closes here today.

Reserve champion steer was entered by Keith Brown, Carlton, Champion of the Hereford class was exhibited by Robert McGreevy, Pomeroy, Wash., and the reserve champion of that class was entered by Rodger Wellman, Baker, Ore.

Don Nichols, Ashland, exhibited the grand champion wether, and Charles Colebrove, Junction City, entered the reserve grand champion.

Two honors went to Hugh Nelson, Albany, with the grand champion pen of late lambs and the grand champion barrow. Bill Ries, Tappahiss, Wash., exhibited the reserve grand champion.

Funeral Friday for Frank McGarvey

PORTLAND, Oct. 12 (UP) — Funeral services were held today in Portland for Frank S. McGarvey, former Bank of Bend President who died here after a lengthy illness.

Services were conducted by the Rev. George Bolster of Bend, with Walter Miesner the soloist. Interment was scheduled for Minneapolis.

Marshall's Report Becomes Best Seller

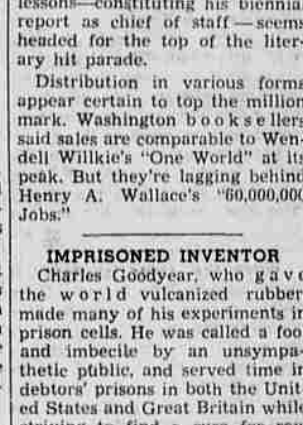
