Married Couple, Baby Object of Search Today

NORTH BEND, Ore. (UPI)—A widespread search was started Wednesday when authorities were notified that a young married couple and their 3 1/2-month-old son have been missing from their home here since last Wednesday.
Alan Erickson, 20, his wife, Anita, 19, and their son, Allan, Jr., left the home of relatives in Cooson about seven miles from here last Wednesday and have not been heard from since. Their landlord advised police of their disappearance.
Officers learned that they had very little cash with them. The landlord reported that things were in order in their apartment, the baby's formula had been prepared, and the family's dog had been left behind.
Authorities said the car might have gone out of control and plunged into the river while they were en route home.

New York Stocks

NEW YORK (UPI)—Stocks rallied today after two sessions of decline that followed a rise in market margins.
Oil issues produced the best gains as a group. Traders turned also to farm implements which were active and strong. Coppers came back after a fall on a cut in the custom smelter price of copper.
Railroads produced some substantial gains. Motors ruled steady to firm in active trading. Chemicals made an irregular rise. Demand for the oils reflected what Wall Street said was an improved statistical position. Gains in the group ranged to 3 points in Amerasia and embraced all issues, including the international oils.
American Motors got into action when the company reported a sharp rise in the sale of its ramblers cars and a statement by Louis Wolfson showing that financier short 132,000 shares of the company. American ran up nearly a point and stood out as one of the most active issues traded.
Building issues were given a whirl with new highs in Marquette Cement and Pittsburgh Plate Glass. U.S. Steel rose a point to feature a rise in its section. In the metals gains running from one point to more than a point appeared in American Smelting, Anaconda, Magma Copper and Miami Copper.
Union Carbide made a new high in the chemicals, Winn-Dixie in the mercantiles, Zenith in the televisions.

Grants Pass Logger Suffers Fatal Injuries

MEDFORD (UPI)—A 42-year-old Grants Pass logger, Everett Fred McCall, was dead on arrival at a Medford hospital Tuesday after a log fell on him at the Steve Wilson mill just south of here. He worked for Deal R. Masters of Grants Pass.
The Jackson County coroner's office said there apparently were no witnesses to the accident but it was believed McCall was unloading a log truck when the log slipped, crushing him.

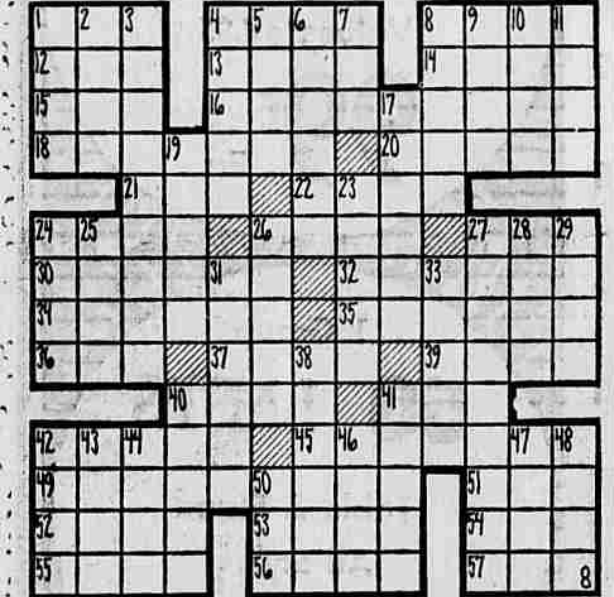
