On Sunday night the players will gather at the college's Doran Hall where members of Shrine lodges in Eastern Oregon will host them at their annual Kickoff Banquet.

Giants Drop Another Game, Virtually Out Of Pennant Race

Ted Williams will be 40 by the end of the month and quite possibly the American League batting champ again by the end of September.

Williams, more or less lying back in the weeds all season, suddenly is sprouting a full-blown .311-average—only 24 points behind the .335 figure of Boston teammate Pete Runnels, who leads the circuit.

Ted's current mark is a far cry from the .388 mark he led the league with last year, but before the season started he promised he'd hit "around .340" and he generally comes pretty close to the mark.

He could make it the way he's hitting now. He blasted his 20th homer and a single to drive in three runs Thursday and help the Red Sox beat the Senators, 8-4, for their fifth straight victory.

His homer was nothing to spit at, either. It traveled approximately 500 feet and landed about 30 rows up in the right field bleachers. Roy Sievers belted his 31st homer and Jim Lemon his 23rd for Washington, both blows coming off Frank Sullivan, who hurled an eight-hitter for his ninth victory.

It was the only game scheduled in the American League.

The Milwaukee Braves stretched their National League lead to seven games with a 3-2 triumph over the Pittsburgh Pirates, while St. Louis crushed San Francisco, 12-1; Philadelphia edged Cincinnati, 3-2, and Los Angeles defeated Chicago, 3-1.

Southpaw Warren Spahn, shooting for a 20-game season for the eighth time in his career, limited the Pirates to seven hits in chalking up his 15th victory.

Bob Friend blanked the Braves until the seventh when they scored all their three runs with the aid of Eddie Mathews' two-run homer.

PCC Heads Arrive For Big Meet

PORTLAND (UPI) — Faculty representatives to the Pacific Coast Conference were arriving here today for a weekend meeting aimed at wiping out the PCC as a force in American sports.

There seemed no doubt in anyone's mind that the two-day special meeting here would wind up Sunday with a vote for dissolution of the conference that has been riddled with dissension since it levied heavy fines against some of its members for violations of the conference code.

It was learned here today that conference coaches, as recently as four months ago at another Portland meeting, submitted resolutions to the Conference expressing confidence in the future of the combine if dissolution could be avoided.

Successful applicants in the drawings will be mailed their tags by August 15. In those areas where the quota was not filled by the filing deadline, no drawing will be held and all applicants will receive tags.

Deer Hunters Should Send Applications

Oregon hunters are advised that if they want to hunt for antlerless deer during the latter part of the general deer season they should submit their applications immediately for the unit in which they intend to hunt. Deadline for submitting applications is August 18, which is just a little more than one week away.

Hunters are also cautioned to follow the directions carefully when filling out their application blanks. The name and address of the applicant must be printed in the space provided, and signed with applicants signature directly below. Include the hunting license

Favored to win the team title is Hermiston, which twice previously this season has defeated Pendleton, dominant district team for the last four years.

La Grande, steadily improving over the past four weeks, received a setback this week in its plans to upset Pendleton for the second spot when Jim Riggs, figured for a first in the 13-14 boys 200 meter freestyle, was confined to bed with illness; Nancy Gray's loss to job responsibilities took one girl's relay team out of competition; Mary Alenburgh left on a vacation trip, and divers Rolfe Pitts and Phil Gray were absent, leaving La Grande without contestants in boys diving. Pitts was with his family on a vacation trip.

A feature of the meet will be the personal duels between outstanding swimmers for high point honors and trophies.

Mary Morgan of Pendleton is favored to win honors for the girls and Billy Graham of Hermiston is favored for the boys, with principal competition coming from Paula Russell of Hermiston and Mike Challis and Mike Jones of La Grande.

Possible new pool and district records are foreseen for Mary Morgan in freestyle and breaststroke, Artie Samson of La Grande in 11-12 freestyle; Jim Johnson of Hermiston in 13-14 freestyle; Mike Jones of La Grande in 13-14 backstroke; Steve Fedor of La Grande in 13-14 breaststroke; Billy Graham of Hermiston in 15-16 breaststroke and individual medley, and Mike Challis of La Grande in 15-16 freestyle.

The 13-16 boys medley and freestyle relay duels between Hermiston and La Grande are a tossup, with La Grande favored in the freestyle and Hermiston in the medley.
