Multnomah Health Office Gets Criticism

PORTLAND (UPI)—The governing council of the Multnomah County Medical Society Tuesday night accepted a report sharply critical of the county health department, rapping it particularly for last spring's head lice scare in Portland schools.

The medical society report declared that the diagnosis of an epidemic of head lice infestations "could not be confirmed by physicians or other qualified experts."

The report also listed three other indictments of the public health department: It has treated children with acute illnesses, despite a lack of adequate personnel or facilities; personnel of the department have, in some instances, disparaged private physicians treating patients; misuse of public money by immunizing children whose parents could well afford that service from private physicians.

The report concluded: "Corrections of defects in administration of the Multnomah County Division of Public Health are urgent" and it added, "Restoration of popular confidence in the division, and of physicians' confidence in its administration, requires that the

'Bomb Moll' Reveals Ring Of Terrorists

AMMAN, Jordan (UPI)—Evidence supplied by a 20-year-old "bomb moll" disclosed the existence of a terrorist ring organized at the American University in Beirut with support from Syria and Egypt. It was announced Friday.

A government announcement said Nadia Salti, arrested in connection with an Aug. 2 bombing, cracked under questioning and gave the names of a score of other plotters—almost all, like herself, recent graduates of the American University.

The conspirators, including a number of professional men and some minor officials, sought last year to overthrow King Hussein, were charged with setting off more than 200 bombs here.

Most of the plotters have been arrested, the announcement said, and many have confessed their guilt.

The government said the ring's activities were inspired by agents of the United Arab Republic (Egypt-Syria) in Beirut and Damascus.

Monkey Virtually Unharmed By Fall Of Giant Balloon

CROSBY, Minn. (UPI)—"Mathilda," a 13-pound female monkey, emerged virtually unharmed from a fast fall of more than 11 miles beneath a punctured balloon.

The monkey and her fellow passengers, a group of frogs, flies and gold fish, were sent up Thursday in a pressurized gondola as part of a series of tests on the effects of cosmic rays in space travel.

Their 20-story balloon, largest expected to soar to 135,000 feet, or 25 miles above the earth. But the big bag burst at an altitude of about 60,000 feet and the storage cargo plummeted to earth.

Only the goldfish failed to survive the fall. Their water container spilled.

The Air Force, which sponsored the flight, recovered the balloon on a farm about 60 miles from its launching site near Crosby.

Group Challenges Need For Services Of Ex-Senator

PORTLAND (UPI)—Multnomah County Commissioners Tuesday challenged the need for the services of former Senator Guy Cordon as a \$1,000-a-month representative for O & C counties in Washington, D.C.

Commissioners Jack Bain and M. James Gleason asked Ralph Peterson, president of the O & C executive committee, for a complete accounting of Cordon's activities for the Association of O & C Counties in the capital.

The commissioners acted after receiving a letter from Lane County Commissioner Robert W. Straub who asserted that Cordon's employment should be terminated immediately.

The Lane county official said that present Oregon senators in Washington were able and willing to look after O & C interests just as Cordon did when he was a senator.

Nautilus Has Completed Man's First Voyage Under North Pole

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Nautilus has disclosed that the atom-powered submarine Nautilus has completed man's first voyage under the North Pole.

It said the historic voyage beneath the ice from Pacific to Atlantic waters presages a new commercial route under the pole for giant cargo submarines powered by splitting atoms.

The White House disclosed the new feat of the world's first nuclear sub at a ceremony in which President Eisenhower awarded the Legion of Merit to the Nautilus' skipper, Cmdr. W.R. Anderson of Bakersville, Tenn.

Anderson and 116 crewmen sailed aboard the Nautilus from Honolulu at 11 p.m., p.d., July 23 on a voyage destined to take the sub 8,000 miles through three oceans to Europe.

At 5:37 a.m., p.d., Aug. 1 the Nautilus surfaced under the Arctic ice near Point Barrow on the north coast of Alaska.

By the time it emerged near Greenland, at 6:54 a.m., p.d., Aug. 5, it had charted a new route in man's long conquest of the seas, discovered an unsuspected deep channel to the Arctic, and found undersea mountain ranges not previously known.

Anderson said the Nautilus cruised more than 400 feet beneath the icecap which was 10 to 15 feet thick, two or three feet less than it is in winter.

The great sub was under the icecap for about four days during which it traveled 1,830 miles. Not once did the submarine's power plant, using primordial energy first tripped by the star, falter or fail.

The great moment came at 8:15 a.m., p.d., Aug. 3. At that hour and minute the Nautilus drove directly under the North Pole and found itself in a new hemisphere.

The Nautilus, named for the fictional ship of Jules Verne's "Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea," had equaled the imaginary feat of its namesake and had opened a new passage between the major oceans of the world.

The Nautilus found and followed a "deep sea valley" 300 to 1,200 feet deep into the Arctic Sea basin. Under the pole it discovered that the water was 13,410 feet deep, 1,927 feet deeper than supposed.

It also discovered ranges of mountains existing deep under the Arctic ice.

From Hawaii to the Atlantic the Nautilus cruised for the most part at a smooth 20 knots.

To receive his award Cmdr. Anderson was brought off the submarine by helicopter 14 hours previously and flown to the White House for the ceremony.

Anderson's citation said that the Nautilus, "in cruising across the top of the world under the ice," "pioneered a submerged seaway between the Eastern and Western hemispheres."

"This points the way," the citation said, "for further exploration and possible use of this route by nuclear powered cargo submarines as a new commercial seaway between the major oceans of the world."

Anderson, 37, said the submarine is now headed toward Europe under its executive officer, Cmdr. Frank Adams.

He recalled that the Nautilus made preliminary excursions under the ice cap last September from the Atlantic side and reached a point 180 miles from the North Pole. He said it ran into "some difficulties" then but that the crew learned a lot.

He was told last winter, he said, to begin secret preparations for a possible voyage under the pole.

He reported that the Nautilus left New London, Conn., last April and travelled through the Panama Canal to the Pacific. It left Seattle June 5 to go to the Bering Straits and the Chukchi Sea and make another preliminary excursion under the ice from the Pacific side.

Demos Approve Nyssa Attorney For Judge Post

ONTARIO (UPI)—The Malheur County Democratic Central Committee Tuesday night voted 18-10 recommending that Nyssa attorney Clyde Snyder be appointed circuit judge for Malheur and Harney counties to fill the vacancy created by the death last week of Judge M. A. Biggs.

The committee said the recommendation would be sent to Gov. Robert D. Holmes today. Snyder is a Democrat.

Judge Biggs, who died of a heart attack, served as circuit judge for nearly 14 years.

Harney county Democratic officials said they concurred with the Malheur recommendation.
