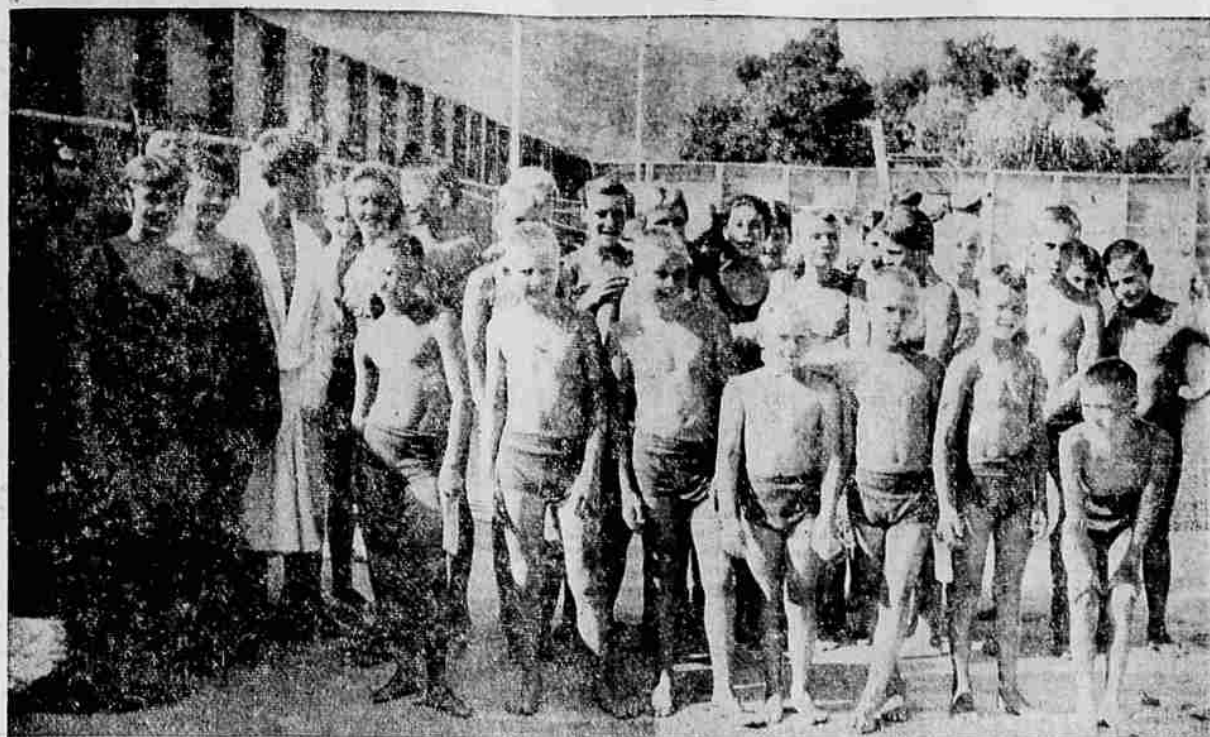




EDGE PENDLETON—The La Grande Swim Club—most of the members are shown above—defeated Pendleton by three points

## La Grande Swim Club Surprises Pendleton; Hermiston Wins Meet

In a record-spangled meet that kept the fans jumping right down to the final event, Hermiston won the Eastern Oregon Swimming and Diving Championships here Saturday over a strong three-club field.

The La Grande Swim Club pulled the surprise of the year by nosing out Pendleton for second place team honors in the last event on the program.

Final team scores were: Hermiston, 458; La Grande, 350; Pendleton, 347. Milton-Freewater failed to appear with its scheduled eight-man team.

The meet, held under bright, warm skies, saw a total of 26 new district and pool records established, exclusive of events held for the first time in the Championships, which automatically became records.

Of the new records set, La Grande, led by Artie Sampson, outstanding 11-12 division performer, established 10, followed by Hermiston with nine and Pendleton with seven.

High point honor trophies were won by Mary Morgan of Pendleton, with a total of 40 points, and Jim Johnson of Hermiston with 33½. Runner-up to Morgan was teammate Doris Bacon with 26. Johnson was followed by teammate Billy Graham with 33 points.

Everyone was a hero on the La Grande club at meet's end, for everyone had a share in the uphill team victory over the strong Pendleton club for second place. With only eight events remaining, Pendleton led La Grande by 15 points, but Coach Don Campbell's swim kids kept whittling away at the lead until they tied it up at 343 points each on Event 49—next to the final event—with Sharon Beickel's tie for first and Vickie Feeder's fourth place in the 200 meter freestyle.

In the final event Mike Hoerlein, racing against Pendleton's Tom See and Hermiston's Charles Wells, moved right out in front at the outset and won the 200 meter freestyle going away to give La Grande second place in the meet over their Umatilla rivals.

New records posted by La Grande swimmers were:

Artie Sampson, 11-12—50 meter freestyle in 33.7 to beat the old pool and district records of 35.4 and 37.4, respectively; 50 meter breaststroke in 48.6 over the old district record of 49.0.

Tom Carman, 10 and under—25 yard breaststroke in 21.4 over the old pool record of 22.0.

Jennifer Smith, 13-14—50 meter backstroke in 41.2 over the old pool record of 43.5.

Steve Feder, 13-14—100 meter breaststroke in 1:33.6 over the old pool record of 1:37.3.

Jim Phillips, 13-14—200 meter freestyle in 2:57.2 over the old pool record of 2:57.4.

## Deer Hunters Can Secure Surplus Tags

Oregon deer hunters are advised by the game commission that surplus deer tags are available for the Snake River and Walla Walla controlled deer hunts following the filing deadline on August 6.

Nimrods who have not applied for some other deer area and would like to take a fine pack trip into these remote, little hunted regions, may obtain these tags on a first come, first served basis.

Hunters are reminded that these are pack areas and unless they have their own horses or make arrangements with guide services, they should not apply. Interested persons may obtain these tags in person or by mail at the Portland office of the game commission. A fee of \$5.00 is charged which entitles the hunter to take two deer, one on the general deer tag, and one on the controlled deer tag.

Hunters are cautioned not to apply for these surplus tags if they have already submitted applications for some other controlled or unit hunt.

In the Walla Walla wilderness area only 154 persons applied for the 500 available tags. A total of 178 nimrods applied for the Snake River pack area for the 500 available tags. All hunters who submitted applications properly filed will receive tags. It might be mentioned that several applications were discarded for lack of signatures, species to be hunted, folding or mutilation.

The Hart Mountain controlled deer hunt is oversubscribed with more than 1,000 applications. A public drawing will be held on Monday, August 11 to determine successful applicants.

## East Shrine Players Welcomed To La Grande At Kickoff Dinner

Twenty-four Class B Shrine football players moved onto the training field this morning after being officially welcomed to Eastern Oregon College and La Grande at their annual Kickoff Dinner last night by Shriners and civic officials.

Gary Burton, coach of the State Championship Stanfield squad last fall, will direct the gridders in two weeks of drill before the Seventh annual game set for Saturday night, August 23 at Pendleton's Roundup Stadium. Burton will be assisted by Al Keck of Merrill and Tom Cox of Sisters.

At the dinner last night, held at EOC's Dorian Hall, Tom Burton, general manager of the Shrine game and originator of the annual battle, told the group of gridders that 250,000 children had been rehabilitated in the Portland Hospital for Crippled Children—the purpose of the game is to raise funds for the hospital.

He told the gridders it was "through their efforts that the hospital could continue its work."

Dave Danewood, secretary-treasurer of the game, told the top B players east of the Cascades, that "in the last six years

the games have netted \$52,500 for the hospital."

Burton told the group that "three men have accepted Jim Puckett's challenge to run a special 100 yard dash between halves of the game. The 9.5 sprinter from Cove last week expressed the desire to add his bit to aid the purpose of the game."

Burton said Warren Sherlock of Walla Walla, Spike Young of Helix and Tom Valet of Amity have thus far answered the challenge. Sherlock was a close second to Puckett at the Carnival of speed in Milton-Freewater, running the century in 10 flat also, while Valet has racked up a 10.2.

The East head coach, Gary Burton, then welcomed the boys to the squad as did Keck and Cox. Burton, from Elgin and son of the games' originator, played quarterback on the first East squad in 1952. He is also a former EOC griddier and graduate of the college here.

Fred Young, city manager, welcomed the boys to the city and Fred Schneider, chamber of commerce manager here, passed out merchandise books, worth five dollars in trade, to the boys. The books are donated by La Grande merchants.

Pafu Forrey, Stanfield player, spoke on behalf of the football players and thanked the Shriners for their welcome.

Team physicians, Dr. William Kubler and Dr. W. K. Ross, both of La Grande, were introduced to the players.

Rainbow girls from La Grande served the meal and Pat Parker played the accordion, while Barbara Wilson entertained the boys with a pantomime.

Bruce Moorehead, manager of the East team, extended the in-

tial welcome to the gridders and John Miller, welcomed the boys to the EOC campus. Ray Osburn of Elgin was master of ceremonies.

Arch Dunsmoor, EOC coach, is trainer for the squad for the next two weeks with Dave Carman and Alan Moser acting as student managers.

Tom Burton passed out the gridders' jackets, a traditional gift, to end the evening's program.

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
