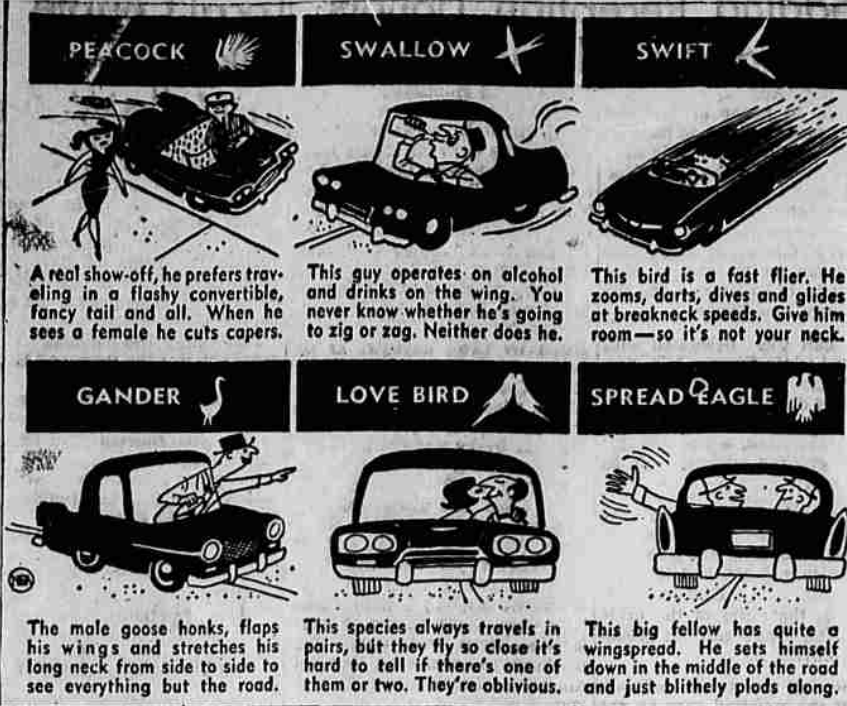

New Measure Protects Indian Fishing Rights

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Judiciary Committee has approved Rep. Don Magnuson's bill to establish penalties for hunting, fishing and trapping on Indian lands without a permit from the tribe.

The Washington state Democrat's bill provides for fines up to \$300 and up to 90 days in jail for violators.

Debate On A-Testing Warms Up

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A United Nations committee report on the hazards of radioactive fallout has stimulated new debate on whether the United States should continue testing of atomic weapons.

Sources close to the situation indicated they would be surprised if this country called off testing without an international agreement to ban such tests, and an inspection system to guarantee enforcement.

One indication was an Atomic Energy Commission statement which said "man must learn to live" with the radiation problem. Russia announced after an extensive spring test series that it was halting its atomic tests, but implied it might resume them if the United States failed to follow suit. President Eisenhower later hinted the United States might announce a similar test halt if scientists learn enough from the current Pacific test series.

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.), chairman of the Senate Disarmament Subcommittee, told the Senate Monday that reports of increasing radioactivity from nuclear tests make it "imperative" that nations having nuclear weapons "immediately reexamine and reappraise our policies" on continued nuclear testing.

He said the U.N. report "shows there is still a great deal about the somatic and genetic effects of radiation that are hidden from us. We are like children playing with dynamite."

He said, however, any such agreement must include an effective inspection system.

Refrigeration Radiation Protection

BURLINGTON, Vt. (UPI) — A Yugoslav physiologist today proposed refrigeration as a protection for space travelers against cosmic radiation.

The scientist, Prof. Jevto M. Radulovic, said research has shown that hypothermy—the cooling of living things to temperatures far below normal—provides protection against many of the hazards of space flight.

These hazards include the regions of intense radiation now known to exist between the earth and the far reaches of space. Radulovic gave his ideas in a paper prepared for the First International Congress of Radiation Research this week at the University of Vermont.

"We may presume with certainty," his paper said, "that in this era of interplanetary flights, hypothermy will play a protective role against harmful cosmic radiation."

The Yugoslav's paper was one of several reports to the congress on means of protecting living things from damaging radiation, whether from atomic bomb fallout, atomic power plants, medical X-radiation, or the rays pelting the earth from solar, stellar, and intergalactic space.

AVCO Manufacturing, active in the missile field, firmed and hit a new high.

The improved outlook in the Middle East helped the international oils, which opened lower but closed generally firm. Chemicals were mixed. Nonferrous metals righted themselves and closed higher. Autos improved fractionally.

Continental Steel featured a firm steel section with a gain of more than 2 points at its best.

Farmers Producing Largest Crop On Smallest Acreage

WASHINGTON (UPI)—American farmers are producing by far the largest crop in U.S. history this year. And they're doing it on the smallest acreage in 40 years.

The Agriculture Department's August crop production estimate this week said the 1958 crop will be 113 per cent of the 1947-49 base

period. This compares with previous record crops, which were 106 per cent of the base period, in 1948, 1956 and 1957.

The department said gains in yield prospects during July now seem likely to make 1958 the nation's biggest crop year "by far."

Navy's Arctic Blimp Back From 9,400 Mile Voyage

WEYMOUTH, Mass. (UPI) — The Navy blimp ZPG-2 landed here Tuesday after a 9,400-mile scientific expedition to within 500 miles of the North Pole, farthest north a lighter than air ship ever traveled.

The long trip, which began July 27, featured a visit last Saturday to Fletcher Island, a 45-mile square chunk of ice also known as T-3. It is manned by scientists, who waved their greetings as the blimp hovered overhead and dropped mail and supplies.

While over the small island, International Geophysical Year scientists aboard the airship dropped depth charges into the sea.

The echoes made by the explosions were expected to aid scientists on the island seeking information on ocean depth and the bottom.

Supersonic Kingfisher Missile Intercepted By AA-Fired Talos

ALAMOGORDO, N.M. (UPI) — The Army's new supersonic Kingfisher target missile slashed across the sky over White Sands Missile Range near here yesterday and was successfully intercepted by the Talos anti-aircraft guided missile.

It was the nation's first publicized firing of an anti-aircraft weapon against the Kingfisher, which can match the speed of any known tactical aircraft in the world, a White Sands spokesman said.

The new target missile, de-

signed and built by the Lockheed Missile Systems Division, is equipped with a firing-error indicator to record automatically either hits or miss distance and pass-angle of the interceptor weapon.

It also carries a target augmentation device which enables it to simulate a wide variety of missiles and aircraft.

The 38-foot long Kingfisher was launched by a B 50 high above the missile range in its test against the Talos defense unit. Shortly after launching, the Talos search system and tracking radar picked up the supersonic target as it flashed through the thin air of the upper stratosphere in an attempt to penetrate the down-range defense system.

The fire control officer, watching the blip of the "hostile" attacker as it swept toward the computed intercept point on his radar screen, pushed the button which started the Talos into action.

The Talos defense unit was then interconnected to equipment which continued to track the target, launch the missile and guide it to the kill. The error-indicator in the Kingfisher transmitted to a ground receiving station that the Talos had struck a vital spot.

Governor Seeks End Of Tie-Up

SALEM (UPI)—Contractors and representatives of the Operating Engineers Union met with Gov. Robert D. Holmes Tuesday in an effort to settle a month-long tie-up of heavy construction in Oregon.

The meeting got under way shortly before noon with a Federal mediator expected to enter the discussion later.

The Governor called the meeting in an effort to get negotiations under way again.

They were broken off last Friday when the Union of Hoisting and Portable Engineers rejected an offer in the dispute over wages and fringe benefits.

Representing the Associated General Contractors at the conference were A. H. Harding, R. E. McNutt, Ed Hubert and E. R. Neill.

The Labor committee consisted of P. R. Wages, George Wesling, Carl Reams and R. F. Cleveland. The discussion was conducted behind closed doors.

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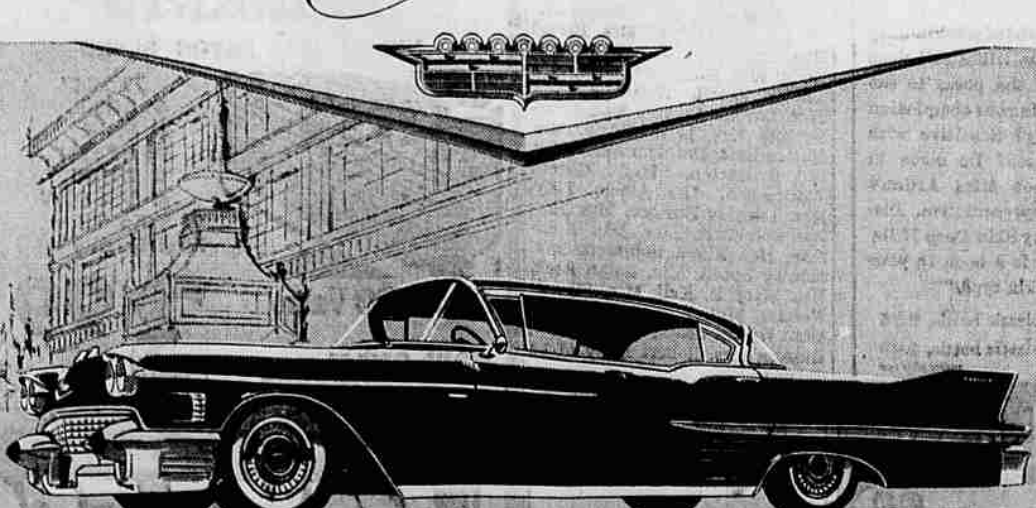
