AF Orders Starfighters Grounded

HAMILTON AFB, Calif. (UPI)

The Air Force has ordered its fastest and newest fighter-interceptor, the F104 Starfighter, grounded for "modification."

The order came from Washington and applied to all Starfighters in the country.

The order came after Capt. Iven C. Kincheloe, 29, who flew higher in space than any man alive, was killed recently near Yuma, Ariz., in the crash of an F104.

The Air Force had intended Kincheloe to fly a rocket-powered plane 60 miles into the atmosphere.

The Starfighter was grounded once before. That was shortly after Col. Raymond Evans, commanding officer of the 83rd Fighter Interceptor Squadron, was killed while attempting to land one at Hamilton AFB on March 3.

The Air Force said "excessive vibration" was to blame for the crash that killed Evans.

A spokesman for the 83rd, which flies the missile-like planes, said of the latest grounding: "It's just like an auto. After six months you stop and tighten the bolts."

Maj. Robert Merrill of Hamilton AFB said "experience has indicated that certain modifications will improve the overall efficiency of the plane."

The F104 was introduced at Hamilton AFB last Feb. 20.

New Circuit Judge

SALEM (UPI)—Ontario attorney Jeff D. Dorrach Jr. was appointed circuit judge for the 9th district of Malheur and Harney counties by Gov. Robert D. Holmes Monday.

Dorrach, a 37-year-old graduate of the University of Oregon law school, was named to the unexpired term of Judge M. A. Biggs, Vale, who died in office two weeks ago.

The new judge is a Marine flying ace and has been practicing in Ontario since 1948.

Medford Newspaperwoman Named To Education Board

SALEM (UPI)—Mrs. Moore (Eva) Hamilton, education leader and newspaperwoman in Medford for many years, was appointed to the State Board of Education by Gov. Robert D. Holmes yesterday.

Mrs. Hamilton, the wife of Medford's postmaster, succeeds Mrs. Lucile O'Neill, Klamath Falls, as a state-at-large member of the board.

Mrs. O'Neill, an appointee of Gov. Douglas McKay, was the first member of the board to serve a full seven-year term. That term expired Aug. 1.

The new board member also served five years on the Medford School Board.

County Fair Booth Pointers In Bulletin

The county fair is as much a part of the American tradition as barn dancing or baseball. But the county fair is now changing to keep up with the modern American way of life and community fair booths should reflect this trend, according to a new bulletin released by the Oregon State college extension service.

The number of farmers has decreased through the years, and many communities have turned to trades other than agriculture, the bulletin points out. Continuing its traditional role as a "show-window" for communities, the fair now tells the story of forestry, manufacturing, recreation, and many other enterprises as well as agriculture.

Written to help individuals, clubs or organizations tell the story of their community most successfully, the new bulletin suggests a step-by-step method of planning a community booth. Determining who will see the booth, what it is to say, selection of a theme, and sketching a plan are discussed.

The bulletin also lists attractiveness, story-telling ability, and simplicity as keys to good booth design. How to develop a center of interest, use of color, and ways to keep the booth balanced yet simple are discussed with the use of colored illustrations. Information is given on materials that can be used in building a booth.

Titled, "Planning a Community Fair Booth," the bulletin was prepared by Dwight Fairbanks and Curtis Reid, OSC extension visual instruction specialists, in cooperation with the extension staffs at the state college of Washington and the University of Idaho.

Oregon residents can get a copy of the new bulletin at their local county extension office.
