

Submarine Polar Cap Route May Be Blocked Part Of Year, Navy Hints

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Navy indicated today the new submarine route under the North Pole may be blocked by shifting ice part of the year.

The entrance to the Barrow sea valley, leading from Point Barrow, Alaska, into the true Arctic basin, is only four or five miles wide and very restrictive, the Navy said in reply to questions posed by United Press International.

"During the Arctic winter this 'lead' would be more difficult to penetrate due to shifting ice conditions," the Navy did not answer directly a question whether the USS Nautilus, prior to its successful voyage under the North Pole Aug. 8, had been turned back in a previous attempt by an 80-foot-thick wall of ice. Such reports

originated in letters home by crewmen of the nuclear-powered submarine.

Picked With Care
But the Navy made it clear the time for the Nautilus' successful voyage was selected with care.

The USS Skate became the second nuclear submarine to cruise under the North Pole Monday while exploring undersea routes beneath the ice cap.

The Navy said the Nautilus sailed from Seattle, Wash., last June 3 to explore ice conditions and make preliminary under-ice excursions in the Bering Straits and Chukchee Sea "to determine feasibility of a cruise all the way across the polar basin."

Following these preliminary investigations, Nautilus returned to make the first visit of a nuclear-powered submarine to Pearl Harbor. While the ship was in Pearl Harbor, the Navy conducted a series of aerial recon-

naissance flights to keep a check on ice conditions to determine the optimum time for the departure from Pearl Harbor, July 23, for the first trans-polar crossing.

Seeks Endurance Record
The Navy said security would not permit releasing information concerning "conclusions as to the practicability of a trans-polar submarine cruise at any given time of year."

Meantime, the Navy announced Wednesday the atomic submarine Seawolf was conducting "environmental atmospheric control tests" in the Atlantic that will keep it

Weekend's Best Food Buys Reported

The following guide to the nation's best food buys for this weekend was prepared in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture and Interior.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Fruits and vegetables continue to top the best food buys across the nation as summer nears its end. Some economical cuts of beef are run-

Among the budget-priced vegetables are increasing supplies of potatoes from a late summer crop about 10 per cent greater than

last year. Green cabbage is plentiful, also carrots, celery, lettuce, onions, snap beans, peppers, squash, tomatoes, and corn.

Meats
Among the protein buys for summer shoppers are ground beef, chuck, round, and shoulder roasts, broilers and fryers, and turkeys. Some markets will feature baking hens. Hams and frankfurters will be attractive values in medium and small size eggs. Dairy products are another plentiful food. Many of these items represent good values.

Best fish buys will include shrimp, fish sticks, and canned tuna.

That's about how the food shopping situation shapes up for this week-end, nationally. Now here's a look at food counters in this area.

West—(Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming):

Beef, poultry, and plentiful fresh fruits and vegetables will be among the best buys consumers will find in the markets this week end.

Beef Prices Down
Beef supplies are increasing,

with prices down 1 to 4 cents a pound this week in California markets and 1 to 2 cents a pound lower in the Northwest. Fryer chickens and hens also are in ample supply, and slightly lower in price. Pork is in good supply and slightly lower in price in the Los Angeles area, but in other markets the supply is lighter and prices mostly unchanged.

Calf and veal continue in light supply. Butter and egg supplies are about adequate for the demand, and prices are mostly unchanged from a week ago.

Among the fruits and vegetables consumers will find plentiful supplies of all melons, grapes, nectarines, peaches, plums, corn, cucumbers, celery, lettuce, dry onions, bell peppers, soft squash, tomatoes and bunched vegetables.

Billboard Standards For Federal Highways Set

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Motorists on the interstate highway system will be assured of some billboard-free driving under tentative regulations announced by the Commerce Department.

Commerce Secretary Sinclair Weeks Tuesday announced the billboard standards on the proposed 40,000-mile federal-state road network.

As unveiled before a Senate Public Works Subcommittee, the federal standards would limit the

use of brand names on roadside ads; clump groups of ads together in "informational site" areas off the highway, and ban the use of moving signs.

The proposed standards would permit individual billboards — "substantially smaller" than present common billboard size — for rural advertisers located within 12 miles of the highway. But they would not permit more than one such sign a mile.

Weeks, who ran into some roadblock to the proposals from Sens. Robert S. Kerr (D-Okla.) and Roman L. Hruska (R-Neb.) said the proposed plan would ban all signs from scenic areas, historical or directional signs.

Weeks said he hoped to be able to spell out the final standards within a week.

Weeks said he visualized the states creating the "informational sites" — similar to rest stops — off the interstate highways in populated areas. Travelers would drive off the road into a landscaped area to inspect various ads on billboard "panels" telling them of nearby hotels, theaters, gasoline stations, restaurants, snake farms or whatever.
