Lunar Rocket Shot Dates Announced

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A top Air Force general said today the United States has a "50-50" chance of blasting an instrument-carrying robot to the vicinity of the moon in the first lunar-probe launching expected next week.

Lt. Gen. Samuel E. Anderson, commander of the Air Research and Development Command, gave his first evaluation of the lunar rocket mounted at Cape Canaveral, Fla.

Roy W. Johnson, director of the Pentagon's Advanced Research Projects Agency, previously had estimated the chance of success in the first lunar shot at "no better than one in ten."

However, Johnson's estimate applied to a different degree of success. In the achievement he spoke of, the radio-equipped robot would pass at least once around the moon and would transmit to earth a picture of the moon's far side which has never been seen.

No Date Set
No date has been announced for the launching, but informed sources said Wednesday the blast-off could occur as early as 8 a.m. e.d.t., Sunday.

Anderson, who is the Air Force's overall boss for both Cape Canaveral and the Ballistic Missiles Command at Inglewood, Calif., discounted the fact the 100-foot lunar rocket's third stage has never been flight tested.

He said in an interview the third stage has received innumerable ground tests and is "a good rocket."

The first two stages of the lunar rocket are the Air Force's Thor-Able, which has carried two space-traveling mice on 6,000-mile journeys into the South Atlantic.

In Airless Space
The instrumented robot journey to the moon would be 226,000 miles and would take at least two days. But only a small amount of additional power is required because the 60-pound robot would be moving in airless space.

Scientists familiar with the project said that if the lunar rocket cannot be fired shortly after 8 a.m. Sunday, then it might be fired shortly after 9 a.m. e.d.t., Monday, shortly after 10 a.m. e.d.t., Tuesday, or shortly after 11 a.m. e.d.t., Wednesday.

If the shot cannot be made at any of those times, then the lunar launching must be postponed until mid-September.

The Defense Department, in a formal statement commenting on the reports, confirmed there are only four days in each month and only a few minutes in each of those days when the relative positions of the earth and moon will permit a lunar probe launching.

EN ROUTE TO THE MOON.—Dale Naylor, 14, of San Diego, Calif., put this kite up almost half a mile into the air, to where it was scaring the pilots of incoming airplanes at Lindbergh Field. At the suggestion of police, Dale grounded his kite and has promised to fly it at lower altitudes.

New TV Outlet Is Forecast
PORTLAND (UPI)—Officials of Trans-Video Company of Oregon said here that they hope to activate television channel 27 in Portland with 20,000 watts by the end of this year.

Wally Matson, co-owner of the firm, said an application has been filed with the Portland city council for permission to alter an existing transmitter station and erect a 248-foot tower on Healy Heights.

Matson said plans for the new station hinged on approval of the permit and acceptance of revised construction plans by the Federal Communications Commission.

The Portland planning commission said in a report to the council that it could not recommend erection of the Healy Heights tower unless de-icing equipment is included to prevent formation of ice on any part of the tower.

NAUTILUS U. S. BOUND
WASHINGTON (UPI)—The nuclear-powered submarine Nautilus will put in at New York harbor for three days after its return Aug. 25 from its historic journey under the North Pole the Navy announced Thursday.

New York Stocks
NEW YORK (UPI)—Stocks retreated today under the pinch tighter money.

Individual losses ran past 2 points in a number of issues, although on balance the market was up from its lows. Chemicals, aircrafts, nonferrous metals, oils and railroads led the market lower.

The market interpreted the Federal Reserve's recent money market moves—an increase in the discount rate in the San Francisco area, an increase in margin requirements and a rise in short-term interest rates caused by a money supply—as signs that inflation is the problem of the hour.

DuPont was off more than 2 points in the chemicals at its low. Allied Chemical also was a weak spot in this group, but Dow Chemical bucked the trend with a small gain. Kennecott was off around 2 at its low on a dividend cut. Other coppers retreated fractionally.

Shell lost more than 1 at its worst, but most of the leaders in the oil group were down fractionally. Losses in the rails exceeded a point or more in a number of issues.

American Motors was down a small fraction. Chrysler was off more than a point at its low. Bendix and United were the weak spots in the aircrafts. Airlines also were under pressure.
