Restrictions On Teenage Drivers Grow

BOSTON (UPI)—More and more states are placing restrictions on teenage drivers' licenses, the Automobile Legal Assn. reported today.

An ALA survey disclosed the following restrictions as result of the high accident and death rate of younger drivers:

—New York state issues a junior license which allows driving accompanied by a licensed operator, and which bans driving in New York City.

—Tennessee restricts young drivers to the immediate neighborhood in which they live.

—Oklahoma lets them drive between home and school only.

—Maryland licensed teen-agers only when the applicant can furnish a certificate of insurance showing that he personally has coverage of \$10,000 to \$20,000 for personal injury and \$5,000 property damage. He must then keep this coverage in force until he is 21.

—Idaho restricts youngsters to daylight driving.

—Arkansas makes the parents of those under 18 sign the application making them financially responsible for the minor's obligations.

Ice Harbor Dam Seen As Aid To River Navigation

WALLA WALLA (UPI)—The Indian Empire Waterways Assn., Inc., explained here Thursday that construction of Ice Harbor Dam, first of a series of four on the lower Snake River, will bring eventual navigation of the Snake to Lewiston, Idaho.

The IEWA asserted that it was conducting a "factual campaign" and that its work had helped bring appropriations for construction of Ice Harbor and the planning of Lower Monumental, Little Goose and Lower Granite dams along the river.

Buy House Now, Experts Advise

By EDWARD VOWAN United Press International WASHINGTON (UPI)—Buy now the experts say, if you're thinking about getting a house.

To a man, banking and housing authorities here agree that interest rates and new home prices have touched bottom for the foreseeable future. Mortgage money, meanwhile, continues in abundant supply.

How long before borrowing costs start turning up is one on which the experts hesitate to speculate. They agree, however, that with mortgage interest rates traditionally more sluggish than others, no noticeable upturn is likely before autumn.

But they also agree that the recent easing of rates and the availability of loan money has ended.

"Families today are getting a better buy in the housing market than they were just a year ago," W. Franklin Morrison, president of the National League of Insured Savings associations, told United Press International. "But how long this will continue is a matter of serious question."

Morrison noted that half of this year's output of new houses is selling for \$14,300, compared to a median price of \$15,000 in 1957.

"The builders have been hungry. They've been going all out" was the way one authoritative building industry source explained it. "But with materials, prices and wages rising they're going to change their tune."

Most opinion that the 1958 drop in interest rates has ended was based on the recent dive in prices in the government securities market. Another indication comes from the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) which reported an increase of one-tenth of a point from July 1 to Aug. 1 in prices paid for FHA-insured mortgages traded in the secondary market.

That gain compared with an average rise of three-tenths of a point per month in the first six months of the year.

The experts agree that mortgage money is still plentiful for qualified borrowers. The National Association of Real Estate Boards found an "ample" supply of funds for conventional financing in 80 per cent of the nation.

Governor Designates United Fund Months

SALEM (UPI)—Gov. Robert D. Holmes has declared the months of September, October and November to be united community campaigns time in a proclamation signed here.

Present were Mrs. S. Mason Ehrman, state chairman, and other representatives of United Funds and participating agencies.

The Governor said that 85 per cent of the population of Oregon will be reached by the 31 federated campaigns this fall as they raise funds to support local, state and national programs of health, welfare and youth work through private and voluntary agencies.

The Governor called on all citizens "to devote their time, energy and money to assure the success of these united community campaigns."

Surrender Study Brings Ike's Denial

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower assured a roused Senate Friday that no federal money has been or will be spent on a study of possible U.S. surrender to an enemy in event of nuclear war.

He issued a statement declaring that the idea of such a project is "nonsense."

The President's reaction to the uproar which rocked the Senate Thursday was outlined to newsmen in a statement read by White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty.

"As far as the President is concerned," Hagerty said, "All this talk about surrender is nonsense."

The press secretary added: "Let me set the record straight. There has been no public money spent to study how or when the United States might surrender. There will be no such money spent for such a purpose."

"The Senate evidently feels about this as does the President. It wants to require that no appropriation be used for such a purpose."

"As to that, the President wants me to say this: Even if he is given the money for such a purpose, it would not be spent. The whole matter is too ridiculous for comment."

No Muscle Flexing For This Fella

CIVITAVECCHIA, Italy (UPI)—Constantino Zintu, 51, has been forbidden to wear a bathing suit in public — by order of the police department here.

Officers said tattoos on his chest, back and arms are objectionable.
