

Giants Down 49'ers 19-10, In Exhibition

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The San Francisco Forty Niners, beaten 19-10 in their opening National Football League exhibition game by the New York Giants, went back to work today with no signs of discouragement.

A crowd of 25,657 turned out at Kezar Stadium Sunday under cloudy skies to watch the 1958 version of the Forty Niners. And they got a look at most of the available talent as Albert used 10 first year men during the contest.

But all the Forty Niner scoring was done by the veterans. Y. A. Tittle found R. C. Owens down in the corner of the playing field in the first period and hit him with a pass from the 40-yard line for a touchdown. Gordy Soltau converted, and also kicked the field goal that completed San Francisco's scoring.

After the Forty Niner touchdown, the Giants knotted the score with one of their own. Bill Jessup's punt was blocked by Cliff Livingston and the Giants took over on the Forty Niner 22. Three plays later Tom Dublinski passed to Frank Gifford for the tally and Ben Agajanian converted.

Less than two minutes later, Livingston again blocked as Jessup attempted to kick from behind the goal line. The ball rolled through the end zone for a safety. Soltau's field goal climaxed a long second period march and the Forty Niners led, 10-0, at half-time.

There was no scoring in the third period but the Giants went ahead to stay in the fourth. Jim Patton intercepted a John Brodie pass on his own 10-yard line and raced 65 yards to the Forty Niner 25 to set up an 18-yard scoring pass from Don Heinrich to Bob Schnelker. Agajanian again converted.

As time was running out, Livingston intercepted a Tittle pass on the Forty Niner 45 and ran it to the eight. When the San Francisco defense held, Agajanian booted a 20-yard field goal to put the game on ice.

Mike Souchak Wins St. Paul Open

Huge Pageant Planned For Shrine Game

The East Shrine football team, after spending the weekend in Portland watching the Class A debacle, and visiting the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children, returned to the practice field this morning for a week of hard work polishing up their play for the game this Saturday night in Pendleton.

Clamber of Commerce Manager Fred Schneider said this morning that ticket sales have been "brisk" and warned fans that the better seats for the game at Roundup stadium are rapidly disappearing.

Pendleton reports that the pageant on Saturday night will be the biggest in history and that the parade starting at 3 p.m. on Saturday afternoon will also be "gigantic."

The Oregon City high school dancing majorettes will make their second consecutive appearance during the pageant. The 23-girl organization proved very popular last year.

In addition to the majorettes' appearance, there will be performances by the Condon Air Force drill team, which will conduct a precision cadence drill, and the Clan Macleay Pipe Band and dancers will perform.

During halftime, Joan Gibbs will be crowned Queen of Shrine football in a ceremony in front of the grandstand. This will be followed by an oriental dance number by Ahlab Court Ladies of Oriental Shrine.

Thirty-five units will participate in the ceremonies, including Roundup Queen Judy Lazinka and her court which includes Kay Smutz of La Grande. A dozen high school bands and drum and bugle corps from Pendleton, Tillamook and Pasco, will be included in the pageant.

Bill Anzen, in charge of the pageantry, said high school bands from Pendleton, Stanfield, Milton, Freewater, Enterprise, Union, Joseph, Irrigon, Heppner, Pilot Rock, Elgin and Echo would be on hand. All members of the parade will be guests of the Shriners at a special luncheon at the Pendleton armory building at 5 p.m.

A trophy will be awarded to the B school band (pep clubs included) making the best overall appearance during the pageant.

A concluding feature of the half time festivities will be the special dash between Jim Puckett of Cove and three other prep sprinters. The race will be run along a marked course on the track in front of the grandstand.

PORTLAND (UPI)—Bob Gutowski, world record holder in the pole vault, won that event with ease at the Pacific Northwest All-Corners track and field championships at Jefferson field in Portland Saturday.

The Occidental college student from Los Angeles cleared the bar at 15 feet 3 inches. Phil Paquin, top-notch University of Oregon freshman pole vaulter, was second with a leap of 14 feet 6 inches.

Cove's Comet, Jim Puckett, who will appear in a special dash at the Class B East-West Shrine game at Pendleton Saturday night, placed second behind Oregon's Steve Anderson in the 100 yard dash. He was fourth in the 220 dash.

John Fromm, competing for Tacoma track and field club set a meet record in the javelin with a heave of 233 feet, 4-1/2 inches.

Mark Robbins, University of Oregon, set a new record in the 3000-meter steeplechase with a clocking of 9:41.4.

The meet marked the return to action of ex-Webfoot Jim Bailey. Bailey took the 800-yard run and finished second in the 3000-meter steeplechase.

Tradition says the team that loses in a National Football League title game goes into a tailspin the following year—but those "losing" Cleveland Browns are off to a much more impressive start in the exhibition season than the winning Detroit Lions.

The Browns, who took a 59-14 wallop from the Lions in last season's lopsided championship game, were their old "hard rock" selves as they scored a 10-0 win over the Pittsburgh Steelers Saturday night.

That was in marked contrast to the Lions' 35-19 loss to the College All-Stars on Friday—an upset in which two future Brownies played major roles, passer Jim Ninowski of Michigan State with 14 of 20 completions and pass-catcher Bobby Mitchell of Illinois with five completions and two touchdowns.

In other games as the "gridiron" exhibition slate got under way, the Philadelphia Eagles nipped the Baltimore Colts, 30-28, and the Los Angeles Rams trounced the Washington Redskins, 31-10, on Saturday night; on Sunday.

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Patterson, Harris In Title Bout

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Champion Floyd Patterson and challenger Roy Harris of Cut and Shoot, Tex., two brawny young athletes with remarkable records, fight tonight for the world heavyweight championship—the ring's golden crown.

Shortly after sundown, they will square off in Wrigley Field for their scheduled 15-rounder in which Patterson—who knocked out 14 of the last 15 men to face him—will try to blast back woodsman Harris' perfect record of 22 straight professional victories.

They are not only the youngest pair to fight for the coveted diadem, but they apparently boast the most enviable records of any duo in the division's title history. The 23-year-old champion lost but one of his 34 starts, and that on a very questionable decision. Harris, 25, is unbeaten.

Because of their records, each should be extremely victory-conscious when he starts tossing the eight-ounce gloves before a crowd that will include Texas oil, cattle and rice millionaires and Hollywood stars of the entertainment world.

The main event is slated for 8 p.m., p.d.t.—11 p.m. edt.

Because of his punch, the champion from Mt. Vernon, N.Y., is favored at 6-1 to tag Harris with his first defeat, and at 3-1 to win on a knockout. Betting has been very light.

Likewise, the ticket sale for Wrigley Field—from \$5 to \$30 a pew—has been disappointingly light. Promoter Bill Rosenzohn, staging his first fight, originally dreamed of a \$500,000 gate; but now he will be lucky to beat the California state record of \$228,500 set by Sugar Ray Robinson and Bobo Olson at the same field May 18, 1956. The paid attendance is expected to approximate 13,000.

Patterson hasn't fought in practically a year. His last title defense was on Aug. 22, last year against amateurish Pete Rade-macher, who had Patterson on the floor before being knocked out by the champion.

Harris hasn't fought since last Oct. 29—about 10 months—when he outpointed Willi Besmanoff of Germany. A six-month hitch in the Army curtailed his fist activities, and tonight's battle will be his first outside of Texas and his first on any brand of TV.

The fight will be sent by closed-circuit TV to 146 theatres and arenas in 115 cities in the United States and Canada. There will be neither home TV nor home radio.

Regardless of tonight's gate and theatre-TV receipts, Harris will receive a flat guaranteed \$100,000. He is the first heavy challenger to get a flat assurance. He got it to make certain he wouldn't stage a possible runoff under urging from the rival International Boxing Club.

Patterson gets a \$210,000 guarantee, with the possibility of receiving more through various percentages of the net gate and TV-theatre receipts.

Milwaukee Sweeps Pair From Phillies, Yanks Lose

Funny game, this baseball. The Braves are leading by eight games and feel like shoos: the Yankees lead by 1½ and feel like sad-sacks—but they'll have to go out and practice today whether they like it or not.

Everything is hunky-dory with the breezing Braves, who ran their winning streak to seven games Sunday by sweeping a pair from the Phillies, 5-1 and 4-1.

On the other hand, everything is all fouled up with the Yankees, who dropped a 6-5 decision to the Red Sox and now have lost eight of their last 11 starts. Since Aug.

2, their lead has shrunk from 17 games.

The schedule says the Yankees have today off. Casey Stengel says differently. He called a practice session for 10 o'clock in the morning.

"I don't know what-a-matter," he grumbled, "But I'm gonna find out in a hurry."

Anyway, the second-place White Sox, still entertaining notions of catching the Yankees, won their fifth straight by beating the Indians, 3-2. Baltimore nipped Washington, 2-1, and Kansas City defeated Detroit, 4-1.

San Francisco took over second place in the National League with an 8-6 triumph over Chicago. Cincinnati swept a doubleheader from Pittsburgh, 4-3 and 7-5, while Los Angeles earned a split by taking the nightcap, 9-3, after St. Louis won the opener, 12-7.

Juan Pizarro's four-hit pitching and Frank Torre's grand slam homer off Don Cardwell gave the Braves their opening-game victory, and in the nightcap, Lew Burdette hurled a five-hitter for, his 13th triumph. Wes Covington hit his 22nd homer and also scored the decisive run on Johnny Logan's perfect squeeze bunt in the fourth inning.

Six home runs were hit in the Red Sox-Yankee game but perhaps even more significant were the three singles and a double by Ted Williams that sent his average up to .316.

Earl Battey's eighth-inning homer off Jim Grant broke a 2-2 tie between the White Sox and Indians. Lefty Billy Pierce gave up nine hits in posting his 13th victory.
