Casey Doesn't Understand Why Everybody's So Nice

DETROIT (UPI)—Casey Stengel said he can't understand why the rest of the American League has been so kind to his New York Yankees but he's appreciative "and if we can get by Detroit and Cleveland, something's gonna happen."

The Yankees close out a three game series in Detroit Thursday and then go over to Cleveland for an important four-game test.

"I think I'm gonna get better pitchin' and you know these guys are gonna hit," Stengel said after the Yankees, looking again like Bronx Bombers, unloaded three home runs to beat Detroit 6-5 and in the process knocked Yankee-killer Frank Lary out of the box.

"The rest of the teams have let us stay close (4 1/2 games) from the top going into today's game," Stengel said. "I don't know why they have. We sure haven't done anything to hurt anyone. I just gotta thank all these fellas for beating each other."

"We've been poor. Everyone knows it. I've been surprised because I've got some men I know can hit for distance and some of those pitchers that are beatin' us aren't 20 game winners," Stengel said.

The Yankee victory over Detroit Wednesday night was the first since last August and only the second Tiger home defeat in 12 starts under Jimmie Dykes who has managed the club to a 20-9 record.

"Two things have shocked this club," Stengel said. "The losses and getting shutout. It's surprising to me. I didn't think you could do that (shutout) to this club—I've got some pretty strong men."

The 2-0 whitewash Don Mossi hung on the Yankees Tuesday was the seventh of the season and in all 1958, New York was blanked just 10 times—still an abnormally high figure during the Stengel regime.

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Beaver Bat Work Slams San Diego To Tighten Race

SAN DIEGO (UPI)—Portland's Ken Johnson took advantage of a 17-hit Beaver attack Wednesday night to whitewash the San Diego Padres 10-0 on a four-hitter.

The big righthander recorded his sixth win of the Pacific Coast League season as he fanned nine and allowed only one base on balls.

The Beavers, now one game behind the second-place Padres, scored four runs in the first—all unearned—and it was all the cushion Johnson needed.

Rookie first baseman Steve Janowski's error on a throw from second base opened the floodgates for the Beavers.

In the fifth, the Beavers scored five times. Clarence Moore started it with a single. Russ Snyder and George Freese singled back-to-back for a run. After Jack Little forced Freese to score Snyder, Jim Greengrass, Jim Westlake, Len Neal and Johnson singled.

Greengrass also hit a homer in the first inning and Snyder had four for five for the winners.

Jose Pagan, rookie Phoenix shortstop, was not around when the Giants captured the Pacific Coast League pennant last year, but he decided to celebrate it in high style anyway.

The Giants officially raised their 1958 pennant Wednesday night and then almost threw a wet blanket over the fun by frittering away a 7-3 lead against Spokane.

The Indians bopped Giant ace Eddie Fisher and reliever Marcelino Solis for four runs in the ninth to tie up the score, but Pagan proved to be the life of the party by belting a game-winning homer in the bottom of the ninth to send the 3,296 fans home smiling.

But if fans of the fourth-place Giants hope to have a similar get-together in 1960, they better figure out what to do about Sacramento.

The Solons have confounded the experts by moving to the head of the PCL chase and staying there. Wednesday night the Solons topped Seattle 5-1 as Carl Greene downed Claude Osteen in a battle of unbeaten aces.

Greene's win was his sixth while Osteen is now 4-1. Sacramento picked away at Osteen with two runs in the fourth, two in the fifth

and one in the sixth. Leading Solon slogger was Buddy Peterson. He doubled in the fourth and scored the first Sac run when Al Heist singled him home. He singled home another marker in the fifth. Mike Krueh also had two hits.

Portland's Ken Johnson breezed to a four-hit win over San Diego while his teammates whacked 17 hits. They scored four unearned runs in the first to sew it up early.

Vancouver won despite being out-hit, 15-11. Bud Watkins contributed two scoreless relief innings to earn his first victory against five losses. He was the fourth of six Mountie pitchers.

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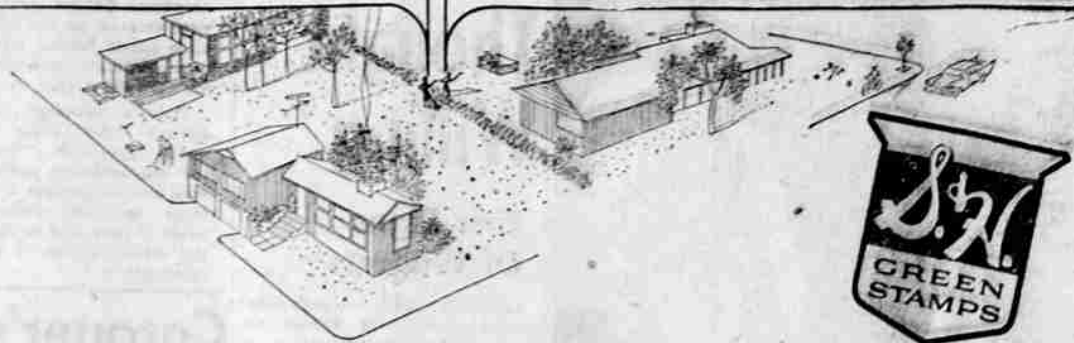
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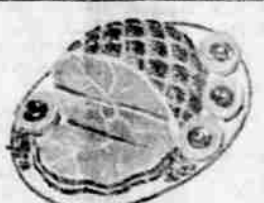
