BURNS, Ore. (UPI)-Five civilian employes of the Boeing Air-plane Company were killed yeserday in the flaming crash of an Air Force B-52 bomber 35 miles

The huge eight-jet bomber de-parted from Seattle yesterday morning on one of a series of low-level experimental flights. It was scheduled to fly at about 500 feet above the ground on a course toward the 34th Air Squadron Radar Station near here. The first report of the crash
