Housewives May Get Extra Mileage Out Of Food Funds

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Housewives may get some extra mileage out of their grocery allowances in the coming months—especially if they like pork. The Agriculture Department reported today: "prices of pork (at retail) already are down, and prices of beef have not advanced further in recent months." Consumers could take heart from the department's monthly report on the livestock and meat situation, but the statistics spelled hard times ahead for meat producers. According to department economists, pork will be a "good buy" at the nation's meat counters for at least the next 12 months. If hog production continues upward, they said, prices in the fall of 1960 "would be seriously depressed." All-in-all, the department said, total meat supplies "are up enough to arrest the three-year uptrend in consumer meat prices." During May, pork prices averaged 7 1/2 cents a pound less than in May of 1958, and the department said the difference doubtless was wider in June. In recent weeks prices of hams were the lowest since November 1957. Beef prices in May — the last month surveyed by the department — were slightly above the same month in 1958. But no changes are expected for the rest of this year, according to the department. "In the next 12 months, cattle slaughter may start upward and prices downward," the report stated. The outlook for prices of lamb-cuts at retail is uncertain at this time, but prices in coming months probably will be no higher than during comparable periods a year earlier. The department was cautious about predicting the long-range outlook for beef prices. The economists suggested that slaughter might be reduced enough in late summer and fall to increase prices moderately. On the other hand, the department said softening of prices this summer could mean that the uptrend in cattle prices is approaching its end. Such a development would be welcomed by consumers, who in 1958 paid an estimated average retail price of 75 cents a pound for all grades of beef. This compares with 63.5 cents per pound in 1957, and 57.8 in 1956.

12-Year-Old Found Alive By Searchers

PINEDALE, Wyo. (UPI)—A 12-year-old boy lost for three days in one of the country's wildest mountain areas was found alive and well Monday night. Felix Madina of Point of Rocks Wyo. was found by a search party at a ranch 30 miles southeast of Pinedale in west-central Wyoming. Sheriff's officers at Pinedale said he was "okay, but very hungry." The boy wandered away from his father and brother Saturday night while the two older men were fishing. When he didn't return, a search party was organized. More than 50 men, half of them on horses, hunted the surrounding terrain for two days, stopping only when it became too dark to see. Airplanes joined the search Sunday but saw nothing from the air. The boy told members of the search party he walked in the day and slept outside at night. He wore only a pair of denim jeans and a pullover jersey to guard him against the 28-degree temperature reported in that area during the weekend. Officers said the boy had no food with him when he disappeared and apparently ate berries to stay alive during his ordeal.

News Briefs

CLAIM AIR VIOLATION TOKYO (UPI) — Communist China charged Wednesday night that a U. S. Navy patrol plane violated its air space off Kwangtung Province. The New China News Agency said the incident occurred Tuesday but gave no other details. TRIAL DELAYED BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI) — The trial of a suburban housewife charged with robbing two savings and loan associations was postponed Monday until Oct. 12 because of injuries she received in a fire Sunday night. Mrs. Kathryn Anderson, 29, a mother of three, was to have gone on trial in federal court on a charge of taking \$2,974 from two savings and loan firms last year.

Teletypes Added To Police System

Eight teletypes were added to the system linking La Grande with other Oregon law enforcement agencies and the Department of Motor Vehicles last Wednesday. Six of the new installations went to the Oregon State Police, one for the sheriff's office in Jackson county and one for the city police in Milton-Freewater after approval by the advisory group in Salem. The La Grande police department sends an average of 120 messages a month over the teletype system. In June the department transmitted only 105 according to Police Chief Oliver Reeve.
